Many Disabled Persons Now Get Social Security

More than 245,000 adults disabled since birth or since childhood are now receiving Social Security benefits, according to C. I. Flaten, district manager of the Salem Social Security office.

These benefits, Flaten said, are payable to an unmarried disabled son or daughter when a parent is receiving Social Security Retirement or Disability benefits. They are also payable when a working parent dies.

In a recent study involving disabled children over 18 years of age, the Social Security Administration found that in 246 cases, 71 suffered benefit losses because of late filing. In terms of money, this loss represents, \$189,127.

"I can't emphasize too strongly," Flaten continued, "the necessity for filing Social Security claims on time. And I am not referring solely to disabled children's claims. The applications are retroactive for only one year so early filing sometimes saves many dollars in lost benefits."

To qualify for these benefits, Flaten said, the disability must have begun before the child was 18 years old, and whether physical or mental, must be severe enough to keep the person from engaging in substantial gainful work. It must also be expected to last for 12 or more months or expected to result in death.
