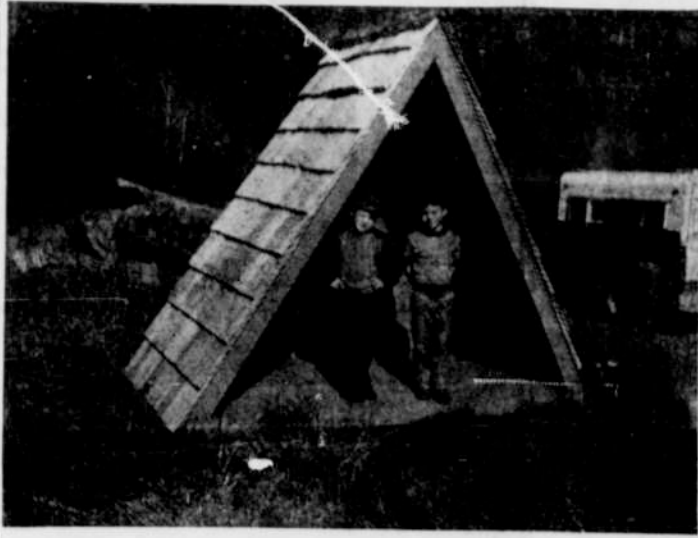
## Eugene Jacobson Completes Mechanics Training Course
