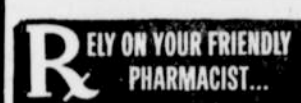

Forest Service To Have Timber Sale

Sealed bids will be received by the District Ranger, Detroit Ranger Station, up to and not later than 10:00 a. m. March 3rd on an estimated 820,000 board feet of federal timber in the Martin Buttes Salvage timber sale. Oral bidding will follow immediately after the opening of the bids.

The sale includes 740 MBF of Douglas-fir logs and peeler blocks advertised at \$40.00 per thousand, 80 MBF of Western-hemlock and other coniferous species at 28.55 and an unestimated amount of Douglas-fir special cull logs and blocks at \$3.40 per thousand. Douglas-fir special cull logs and W. hemlock and other species will be sold at fixed rates.

There is within the sale area 66 acres of all species logs substandard because of defect or size which the bidder may elect to purchase at 0.75 per acre. Bid for the substandard logs is optional, but if included in the bid the tract will be sold at the advertised rate.

The stand of Willamette National Forest timber is located approximately four miles northwest of Detroit up the French Creek Road.

Ada Plymale Claims To Be Oldest Native Born Citizen

An era in Mill City came to an end recently when Mrs. H. I. Plymale (formerly Ada Sullivan) closed her dry-goods and ready-to-wear store, known as "Ada's Needle Shop," after conducting continuous sales for the past several months, thus liquidating the major portion of the stock.

Mrs. Plymale, who considers herself the oldest native-born citizen of this town, was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Sullivan, old-time pioneers here, her birthplace being near where the Eugene Gregory place is at present. She had been in the professional dress-making and store business for a total of 56 years.

"Ada," as practically everyone calls her, purchased the dry-goods stock of Miss Daisy Hendricson, who had been in business in the old Hammond Lumber Company store (where the U. S. Bank is now) since 1935 and moved it into the old Dawes Building (the first location for Hill Insurance) much later, in October of 1952. After only three months, Mrs. Plymale moved her store across the river to the Linn County side where Verne's Barber Shop is located, then after about one and one-half years, into the C. E. Mason building on Broadway, making over 17 years in the retail business all together.

Acquisition of some of Mrs. Plymale's stock through the years could bring a bit of nostalgia to long-time residents here, as it was originally owned by Mrs. Harry (Millie) Wood, Jack Colburn's mother, when she had her little store where the Mill City Enterprise office is now. After Mrs. Wood's death, it was sold to Mrs. Dell (Jennie) Smith who moved it over to the Oddfellows Building, later selling out to Ada Plymale, who also purchased part of the stock of Ressler's Store on the Marion County side.

The remainder of Mrs. Plymale's stock is stored in the basement of her home, but she may decide to have a "garage sale" later on. She has been ill with virus pneumonia off and on for the past several weeks, but thinks she is finally "over the hump." Her many former customers wish her much contentment in her well-earned retirement from waiting on the public.

Shrine Circus Billed At Salem Armory March 9 and 10

The Hubert Castle International three-ring circus is slated to come to the Salem Armory March 9-10, according to Albert Toman of the Santiam Shrine club. There will be an afternoon performance at 4:15 on both days so children can attend after school is out. There are no tickets available for the Monday evening performance, and the Tuesday evening show will begin at 8:15.

Funds raised by sponsoring the circus goes to a worthy cause—the Shrine hospitals for crippled children. These hospitals specialize in treating their patients without cost, and without regard to race or religion. It is for crippled children whose parents or guardians are financially unable to meet the cost of treatment.

The Shriners operate 19 orthopedic hospitals and three Burns Institutes. The Northwest hospital, which serves this area is in Portland. The Burns Institute nearest Oregon is at Galveston, Texas, where last year Jane Bales of Turner is receiving treatment. At the hospital in Portland children under 15 years old, afflicted by club foot, dislocation of the hip, curvature of the spine and other deformities that come within the scope of the orthopedic surgeons work are the chief concern.

Each Shrine Temple has a local representative to act as liaison between needy children who qualify and the crippled children's hospital. Albert Toman is the representative here. Tickets to the circus are available in Mill City at Stewart's Grocery, Rose Hardware, and Albert Toman; in Mehana from John Shafer, and George Laird in Stayton.
