Have our feet back in the snow (?) after our two week dream vacation to Hawaii. Some people, of course, jet back and forth across the Pacific according to their mood and the sun. We would love to again be caught up in the Island magic—but if we don't make it—we lived each day while there to the fullest. And that is a good philosophy anywhere.

Don't have to repeat this to those that have been there—but be sure and visit all the islands—Oahu, Kauai, Maui and Hawaii—if possible. Each has its own enchantment. Our trip down the Kona coast was a memorable experience and we would particularly like to go back there. The people are warm and friendly everywhere but especially so it seemed to us at Hilo. There was a tranquility that eased taut nerves. If we could only RETAIN that. Honolulu has everything—including warm sandy beaches. But it was so busy and crowded it was hard to "hang loose"—a term my Boss wishes I hadn't brought back with me.

To the more serious side . . . We took many tours and found that the people native to the Islands are very proud of their heritage and culture. The Polynesian Culture center is a good example of this—a Must on a trip over there. Many young people attending the Mormon College in that area provide tourist entertainment, helping them work their way through college. The educational systems seem to be very fine and it was pointed out to us several times that at the University of Hawaii—most students were there for only one purpose; to get a n education. As our tour director told us, "there are no second chances here". We also discovered that the Hawaiians take a very dim view of Hippies and said there were very few among their own race. In fact we didn't see many—most of them at the port of Lahaina.

On the Small World side—The first people we talked to after landing at Hilo were Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Westenhous of Salem. He is a brother of Laura Neal at Lyons and Mrs. Westenhous and I went to Oregon Normal (OCE) at the same time. We also spent a pleasant evening with Doc and Gordie Garton, former residents now living near Honolulu. They took us to see a go-d show at the controversial Queen Surf club.

On the personal side—I could write a book about the interesting people that we met in our tour group of 40—some day I may. We were escorted first class all the way.
