## Marine Corps Has New 180 Day Delay Plan

The Marine Corps is now accepting applications for enlistment to enlist now and serve later. Any qualified young man may enlist now into the inactive Marine Corps reserve and remain in this status until he is discharged from the inactive reserve and enlisted into the regular active Marine Corps. The date of beginning active duty is up to the individual concerned as long as it is within the 180 days allotted. Advantages to this program are: (1) time off of total military obligation (2) improved chances for promotion (3) increase in normal base pay upon reporting for active duty.

Whether a two, three, or a four year enlistment is chosen, the 180 day delay program will be in effect. IDANHA — A Portland couple on their honeymoon and a Bend woman were injured Sunday about 1:30 p. m. in a two-car accident on the North Santiam Highway near Santiam Junction.

State police identified the drivers in the collision as Richard A. Robinson, 56, Portland, and Lee C. Couch, 32, Bend. Robinson and his wife, Lelia, 47, were taken to Santiam Memorial hospital by Detroit Mobile First Aid unit, and then transferred to Portland. Officials there said both were in fair condition late Sunday following treatment for internal injuries. Ambulance attendants said Robinson also sustained a compound fracture of the right leg, and that his wife suffered multiple face and scalp lacerations.

Officers said the Robinsons were married in Portland only a few hours before the accident.

Edna Couch, 39, was in fair condition in a Bend hospital where officials late Sunday said she was being treated for lacerations and abrasions.

Reports indicated a motorist with insufficient passing clearance was to blame for the smashup. The motorist did not stop at the scene of the accident.

ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY  
Pollution control is a popular subject these days. The current Administration is insisting that government's "own house be straightened out" with deadlines for federal agencies to comply.

And American industry is stepping up its programs for pollution control. The National Industrial Conference Board in a recent survey covering 248 companies showed that their expenditures for pollution control had risen 28 per cent to a total of \$306 million for the year 1969.

The survey also points out that industry will face a trend of rising capital expenditures for pollution control due to the need to keep pace with anticipated growth.

To bring the land, water and air back to normal will require vast expenditures. It's an all-out job for all groups, public and private, to attain better environmental quality.

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
