It's Your Law

Respect for Law Makes
Democracy Live
LAW DAY USA, May 1, 1970

The Congress of the United
States has set aside the first
day of May as Law Day, U.S.A.
This year will mark the Na-
tion's thirteenth annual ob-
servance of Law Day—a special
day for reaffirming our loy-
alty to the United States and
rededicating ourselves to the
rule of law.

The benefits that have come
to each of us as individuals
and to all of us as Americans
through our adherence to the
rule of law are endless. It is
through the processes of law
that our Nation has achieved
its amazing growth and devel-
opment in every sphere of
human endeavor.

The law does not rule by
itself. Citizens administer it,
and each citizen must abide by
its constraints and accept its
responsibilities if the rights,
freedoms, opportunities, and
protections of all citizens are
to be guarded.

NOW, THEREFORE, I,
RICHARD NIXON, President
of the United States of Amer-
ica, do hereby urge the people
of the United States to observe
Friday, May 1, 1970, as Law
Day in the United States of
America with appropriate pub-
lic ceremonies and by rededi-
cation to our form of govern-
ment and to the supremacy of
law in our lives. Especially, I
urge the legal profession, the
schools and educational insti-
tutions, civic and service or-
ganizations, all media of public
information, and the courts
to take the lead in sponsoring
and participating in appropri-
ate observances throughout the
Nation.

And, as requested by the
Congress, I direct the appropri-
ate Government officials to dis-
play the flag of the United
States on all public buildings
on that day.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF,
I have hereunto set my hand

this twenty-ninth day of Janu-
ary, in the year of our Lord
nineteen hundred seventy, and
of the Independence of the Uni-
ted States of America the one
hundred ninety-fourth.

QUESTION: Does a register-
ed nursing home, a non-profit
organization, pay unemploy-
ment insurance taxes?

ANSWER: At the present
time, a nursing home which is
non-profit, and is connected
with a charitable or religious
organization, does not, by law,
pay unemployment insurance
taxes on its employees. How-
ever, all private, registered
nursing homes, whether they
make a profit or not, if they
are not a charitable or relig-
ious organization, are required
to pay unemployment insur-
ance taxes to cover their em-
ployees. The law spells out
that such charitable and relig-
ious organizations are exempt
from unemployment insurance
taxes as long as no part of the
net earnings of the organiza-
tion inures to the benefit of
any private shareholder or in-
dividual.

Illegal To Own Walking Catfish

Oregonians are advised that
it is illegal to possess the ag-
gressively predacious walking
catfish, a member of the cat-
fish family native to Asia and
Africa.

This is a federal regulation
which became effective Janu-
ary 1, 1970. According to the
Fish and Wildlife Service,
which administers the impor-
tation of exotic fish and wild-
life, the regulation banned the
importation, transportation, or
acquisition of this fish or its
viable eggs.

John McKean, state game
director, said that the walking
catfish has already been intro-
duced into Florida and several
other southeastern states. It
is difficult to eradicate and
specimens readily escape from
captive. He urged any per-
son who already has these fish
in aquaria to either destroy
them or call the Game Com-
mission, which would destroy
the fish for them. In no event,
McKean said, should these fish
be turned loose.

According to McKean, the
federal rules banning the ac-
quisition of these fish would
be enforced.
