Voters who are eligible for absentee ballots may make application in writing to the Linn County Clerk's Office or appear in person and sign an application. In this case a voter may cast his ballot at the clerk's office.

To be eligible for an absentee ballot you must reside more than 15 miles from your voting place, be in the military service, be physically unable to attend the polls or expect to be absent from the county

on election day. The county clerk said this is the first year that voters have been able to vote an absentee ballot on the day of the election without a sworn affiday-
