Local Students Earn Honors

Names of 1500 students have been announced as 1970 Oregon Scholars by the State Scholarship Commission. The students earning this honor are selected from all high schools in Oregon on the basis of their outstanding academic achievement. It was explained by Sidney Schlesinger, chairman of the commission.

The Oregon Scholars award now in its third year, was established by the State Scholarship Commission with the endorsement of Governor Tom McCall and State School Superintendent Dale Parnell.

Purpose of the Oregon Scholars award is to give recognition to the academic attainments of students who have excelled in high school, whether or not they have the financial need which qualifies them for state scholarships, Schlesinger said.

Average grade point of those named as Oregon Scholars this year is 3.82. Jeffrey M. Lee, executive director of the commission, reported. The group chosen as Oregon Scholars was selected from the 1970 graduating classes of Oregon high schools totaling approximately 37,000.

Each recipient will be presented with an Oregon Scholar certificate by the commission. In addition, Governor McCall and School Superintendent Parnell will send letters of tribute to the Oregon Scholars of each high school. Most high schools also will incorporate Oregon Scholar awards presentations into their graduation ceremonies.

The Oregon Scholar award certificates were designed and furnished to the Scholarship Commission by the Crown Company, Portland. These award certificates are presented to each person so honored.
