## Up and Down The Avenue

I had several people say they expected some comment from me on the recent killings on Ohio's Kent State University. First of all let me reiterate my stand that some people will be killed if this type of violent protest continues on our campuses and streets of our cities. I am extremely sorry that these things happen, but if people are going to cause this type of destructive disturbances, they will have to suffer the consequences. The trouble is that when there is so much violence, innocent people are apt to be the ones to be hurt. That is the deplorable thing about all this type of dissent.

I don't think the adult generation should apologize to the current group of dissenters. If it were not for the advances the so-called "establishment" has made over the years, those protesters would have no campuses or universities to destroy. Some dissenters say society is immoral, and I wonder if the younger generation can say that they are all sunshine and light, and so pure. I do not mean by this that the younger generation as a whole should be lumped into a group any more than adults. There is where most of the trouble lies. It is a real small minority of students who are causing all the difficulties. The time is at hand when the good, hard-working students should regain control of their colleges and universities, and get the radicals out of circulation. It will be hard to do, and some of the good kids will probably take some lumps in achieving this goal, but certainly it is better than letting such a few destroy their only hope of a good education.

I was more than happy with the reaction of one Mill City and one Stayton resident. The one here, after the Kent University affair immediately called his son, and made the statement that if he heard of him taking part in any of the marches or other disturbances, he'd bring him home. The Stayton man has a son entering the U of O in Eugene this fall, and he said, if just once you get involved in any of these radical moves, I will immediately bring you home. These are the kind of parents we need today. Many are entirely too permissive.

Now we come to the Nixon move when he sent troops into Cambodia. To me this was a wise move, only it should have been done earlier. Why should we allow the Viet Cong to have a sanctuary in Cambodia from whence they can strike us any time they wish—then sneak back across the border out of reach. I think Nixon was right in this move, and should certainly have the support of everyone who is anxious to get our fighting men out of this mess.

I have been against all wars, starting with War I. I was real young then, but felt the impact of this one. Then we got into War II, and it was a bad one. Since that time we have been, most of the time, embroiled in some type of conflict. Korea, and now the Asian fight. Worst of all I hate this War III we are fighting right here at home, when we are letting a real small minority tear our country apart. We have no time for anarchists, who are doing their very best to tear down all the good that has been accomplished in our country since its inception. They should hang their heads in shame for acting in this manner. They can disagree with our elected officials, but that does not give them the right to burn and destroy property. They certainly should not be proud that they have caused some institutions of higher learning to close. They are defeating themselves. The sooner they learn to meet peacefully and quit their infernal shouting of obscenities, the sooner they can get back to getting an education—which I have been lead to believe is the purpose of our colleges.

## Girls Track Place Third In District

Santiam's small but hard-working girls track team placed third in the District 8 A-2 girls track meet at Regis, May 9th. Gervais scored 142 points to grab the District title while Cascade came in second with 91 points. Santiam earned 39 points.

Janice Lewellen pulled in 18 points by winning the 100 yard dash and placing second in the 220. Her winning time in the 100 was 12.5 and her time was 29.1 in the 220.

The 440 yard relay team, Becky Earhart, Betsy Lamunyan, Susan Crowther and Janice Lewellen, placed second with the time 56.05. Placing 3rd in the 100m, hurdles was Becky Earhart with the time 18.55. Becky also placed 6th in the long jump with a jump of 14' 10".

Winding up the scoring for Santiam was the 880 yard relay team, Becky Earhart, Sonja Martin, Susan Crowther and Rebecca Savage, who placed third with the time of 2:10.9.

The scores of the other teams at District, in order, are Chemawa 27, North Marion 27, Gladstone 24, Woodburn 20, Scio 15, Salem Academy 13, Stayton 10, Regis 10, Western Mennonite 9, Sacred Heart 7, OSSD 4, and Jefferson 0.

Chemeketa Com. College To Get Funds for Students

The Division of Student Services at Chemeketa Community College has been notified that the college will receive \$21,300 of federal funds to provide Educational Opportunity grants for needy students attending college. The allocation is for the period July 1, 1970 through June 30, 1971.

Paul Wilmet, Chemeketa Community College President, said, "This is the second year that Chemeketa Community College has participated in this federally assisted financial aids plan. The allocation of federal funds for the current year was only \$1,116."

## Water and Land Meet Scheduled

The Willamette Basin Task Force is presenting its plan for water and related land resource development to the public on May 20 in Salem. The public is invited to attend the presentation which will start at 2:00 P. M. in the Assembly Room of the Marion Motor Hotel.

The Task Force plan is the result of a 6-year study which involved 35 State and Federal agencies. The study was directed by representatives of the State of Oregon; Federal Power Commission; and Departments of Army; Agriculture; Interior; Labor; Commerce; and Health, Education and Welfare.

The plan, which will be used by the various agencies and Congress as a guide to future water resource development, includes recommendations for such elements as storage reservoirs, channel improvements, diversion works for irrigation, bank revetments, watershed improvements, navigational locks, and fish passage facilities. The plan also recommends a variety of water related programs such as land treatment, reforestation, and environmental preservation.

Fred D. Gustafson, representing the State of Oregon as Chairman of the Task Force, will make the presentation of the plan. Representatives of the various agencies involved in the study will be on hand to answer questions.

## 1970 UGN Goal Set at \$442,189

Ed Davis was among the panel chairmen when the United Good Neighbors Directors met Thursday in Salem to approve a report of its Budget and Admissions Committee allocating U.G.N. funds to the 44 services and agencies.

Last year's goal was \$387,807. The total agency request was \$538,943.

The Volunteer Bureau of Salem, Inc., is a new agency admitted to the family of Agencies of the UGN this year. Purpose of the Volunteer Bureau is "to organize and coordinate volunteer services so as to eliminate duplication of effort and resources in the community, to serve as a clearing house for volunteers through recruitment, interviewing and referring of volunteers to qualified civic, cultural, health and welfare, recreational and educational non-profit agencies and organizations; to serve the public as a link between those in need and those who can help."

## Need for School Bond Explained

The combined Board and Budget Committee of Administrative School District 129J at their special session May 4, after due consideration of the problem decided to present a special election for the purpose of constructing the music room addition to the Santiam Classroom-Auditorium. The decision to present the issue to the voters was based on the following criteria:

1. The music program in the district is recognized to be one of the finest in the state.
2. The present music room facilities are inadequate, due to the steady growth of the music program.
3. The bid of \$28,000 for construction of the music room, accompanying the auditorium bid, is extremely low in terms of present-day construction costs—slightly over \$11.00 per square foot.
4. To postpone the construction for a full year would increase the cost an estimated \$14,000.00. This is, of course, assuming there would be no inflationary spiral. If there were an inflationary spiral, the increased cost would be even higher.
5. To delay construction for even one year would complicate the final landscaping procedure and further raise total costs.

The Board and Budget Committee members were unanimous in their opinion that it would be advantageous to the district and the community as a whole, to complete the construction at the present time.

In order to do so, a levy will be placed on the ballot for the specific purpose of constructing the music room addition to the Santiam Classroom-Auditorium. It is estimated that this one-year levy will be no more than \$0.70 per thousand dollars of true cash value. It should also be emphasized that this will be a one-time levy, and will not extend over additional years.

## Patch of Poison Oak Used for 'Play Salad'

Mrs. John Roten who with her family lives on highway 22 between Mill City and Gates reported this week that she and her husband finally found what was causing her to break out with a rash. It was good old poison oak which was found when they were clearing a small rocky place back of their home. Mrs. Roten said the poison oak was climbing up an old oak tree on the property.

Their young daughter, Judy, told her folks that she used this "weed" in her play salads in the summer, and evidently is immune to poison oak. Not so for Mrs. Roten as she has been bothered with the rash for some time. They will now be able to clear the area, and it should relieve her suffering. Judy will have to find something else for her play salads.
