Detering Demands Action On University Disorders

Gerold Detering, representative from Linn County in the Oregon State Legislature, this weekend called on Governor Tom McCall to take "immediate and positive steps" with the Chancellor and the State Board of Higher Education to deal with conditions involved in the disorders that have occurred in state institutions of higher learning.

Detering pointed out that he is being deluged with complaints from citizens who are no longer the "silent majority" but who are speaking out in no uncertain terms.

Calling attention to the well established reports of faculty members being involved in rebellious confrontations on the University campus, at Portland State University and other taxpayer-supported institutions, Representative Detering advised the Governor that "desecrations of the flag, taking over city property, and barricading streets must not be tolerated if the University is to continue as a taxpayer-supported institution of higher learning." He added that "my constituents have let me know they do not intend to continue to support a University which operates with such disregard for law and order."

In his letter to Governor McCall, Detering specifically requested that the governor, with his appointive power and control over the Board of Higher Education, take immediate and positive steps to insist that the Chancellor and the Board measure up to the obligation of providing law and order on campus, investigate impartially and with "full authority" to deal with and remove if necessary such faculty members as cooperate, aid or abet, and/or participate in campus uprisings, mob activities or other lawless actions that may or could require the presence of police or other law enforcement personnel."

Commenting on his request to Governor McCall, Detering said this matter is one of the most serious problems facing our state as well as other states at this time. "Although there is much evidence that campus disorders as such are being or may have been fomented by outside agitators working with a small but highly volatile element of the student body, I am greatly concerned over the possibility that even though but a small number of faculty members participate in such disturbances, the entire concept of the integrity and high purposes of members of the University's faculty may become distorted in the eyes of the public. The taxpayers loyalty and cooperation in promoting the best interests of our state institutions of learning is definitely involved in this problem and must be maintained if public education is to be above question."

One man writes that because of the riot at the University of Oregon he will oppose the 19 year old vote.
