Permits To Burn Now a Must

DETROIT—Residents in the Detroit-Idanha area are again being warned about the rules and regulations set forth by the State Fire Marshal on the burning in trash barrels.

Permits must be obtained, and barrels must be screened. A water hose and other fire tools are to be within reach of the burning site, and no fire is to be left unattended. No open burning will be permitted and permits may be obtained from Fire Chief Dave Roberts, Idanha, and David White and Wayne (Salty) Wright in the Detroit area.

In two separate instances this week in the Detroit area fire were set in unscreened barrels and left unattended. Fire danger is high now and people must be careful.

Lightning Hits Forest; Starts Fires

DETROIT—A brief electrical storm moved over the Detroit District of the Willamette National Forest about 7 p. m. Saturday leaving five potential fires in its wake.

Fires were reported below Gold Butte Lookout (up the Breitenbush), Heater's Creek in the McKinney Creek area South of Detroit dam, and Bowerman Lake in the wilderness area, about four miles South of Marion Lake.

Smoke spotted in the Halls Ridge and Boulder areas apparently produced no fire, Forester Dick Gassner, assistant fire control officer at the Ranger Station said Monday. He said a close watch was being kept on the two areas.

All three fires in the other areas were immediately manned by Forest Service personnel, and three smoke jumpers from the Redmond Air Center were dispatched to the Bowerman Lake fire.

Gassner said all three of the fires are out but that a patrol is being maintained on them. Another brief thunderstorm was noted about 4 a. m. Sunday, but apparently did no harm.
