Memorial Services Held For Teague

STAYTON—Memorial services for Troy Eugene (Gene) Teague, 58, of 1837 Cedar St., who is presumed drowned in a June 25 boating accident on the Salmon River in Idaho, were at 2 p.m. Saturday at the Stayton High School auditorium, Rev. L. Dwight Curtis officiating. A large crowd attended the services.
 Born in Tennessee, he lived in Oregon most of his life and owned and operated Gene Teague Chevrolet Co. in Stayton the past 20 years. He was active in civic affairs and was awarded the Stayton Chamber of Commerce First Citizen award in 1958. He served as president of the chamber in 1960. He worked on Community Chest campaigns for the North Santiam area and was director of the Stayton Welfare Fund from 1960 to 1969. He was a board member of the Marion County UGN from 1961 to 1967.
 He was interested in horsemanship and served as president of the Northwest Saddlebred Association from 1964 to 1966. Boating had become his major hobby and he worked with the development of several recreational areas. He served as president of the Salem Chapter of the Association of Northwest Steelheaders in 1968. He was a founder and board member of the North Santiam River Guides. He was an active member and past president of the North Santiam Chamber of Commerce.
 Survivors include widow Grace; daughters Mrs. Leslie Darby, Portland, and Mrs. Kathleen Bell, Eugene; brothers W. L., Walla Walla, Wash., Emerson, Salem, Charles, Eugene, Hugh Mercer, Medford, and James Mercer, Portland; sisters Mrs. Lester Clark, Stayton, and Mrs. Charles Spencer, Eugene; five grandchildren.
 The family guests contributions to the Shriner's Hospital for Crippled Children in Portland. Weddle mortuary was in charge.

Recreation Good; Fire Danger High Now in Forests

Recreation report from the Willamette National forest indicates that fire danger is very high. Those entering the forest are asked to be extremely careful and observe all state and federal regulations regarding fire.
 For those interested in wildflowers there are several species of fireweed that bloom from June through September. Their usual habitat is on burned over ground or places where there is dry open soil.
 The road into Breitenbush Lake is very rough and caution should be taken in driving this. The last two miles into Elk Lake is rough and travelers are advised to drive slowly.
 Hikers might enjoy a short 0.3 mile trail to Gold Butte Lookout Trail 3350. The uphill trail is easy to climb and offers a good view of the Cascades from the 4618-foot elevation. This lookout is the only one manned in the district.

Shrine AllStar Football Mix Set for 15th

The 23rd renewal of the Shriners hospital all-star football game, featuring Oregon's outstanding high school seniors of last year, is scheduled for 8 p. m. Saturday, August 15 in Portland civic stadium.
 The kickoff will be preceded by an hour of pageantry, including marching bands and colorful drill units.
 As time for the colorful contest neared, rival coaches were predicting a free-wheeling, high-scoring affair. The Metro team, tutored by Chuck Peterson (Portland), will be out to snap a 4-game losing streak.
 State's coach, Fred Spiegelberg of Medford, has consistently expressed concern about the size of his opponents, stating that "it looks like we'll have to try and go over or around them."
 If State does go to the air, Quarterback John Kerr of Eugene's Willamette high is expected to see considerable duty. In practice sessions during the past two weeks, the 6-foot, 1-inch Kerr has appeared to be State's top thrower. He is backed up at the quarterback post by John Michielli of Hermiton and Kevin Luckey of Springfield's Thurston high.
 State can also unleash several runners who are capable of eating yardage in large quantities—Rod Anderson of Pendleton, Bill Lewis of Grant Pass, Wally Mason of Corvallis and Greg Hansen of Albany.
 The Metro ground attack probably will be spearheaded by Woodrow Green, the 190-pound speed merchant from Portland's Jefferson high.
 "You don't try to stop Green; you just hope to keep his runs to a minimum," Spiegelberg explained. "He's one of the best to come out of an Oregon high school in a long time." Green is ticketed for Arizona State for his collegiate football.
 Big men in the Metro forward wall are led by Lloyd Graves, the 275-pound wrestling champion from Central high in Independence. He will be flanked by such as Bob Peterson, 235 pounds, from St. Helens; Jerry Shultz, 245, Jesuit high; Lloyd Grimrud, 225, Benson Tech (Portland); and Jim Stull, 225, Milwaukie.
 Budd Burnie, the game's managing director, said there are still a lot of good seats available for the game, starting at 10 a. m.
 To date the game has raised approximately \$500,000 for the Shriners hospital.
