New Forest Service

John Devereaux is the new Fire Control officer who came to Detroit Ranger District as a replacement of By Rarey, who transferred to Eugene as Fire Dispatcher of the Willamette National Forest.

Devereaux has had a long and varied career in Forestry, beginning on the trail crew on the Wenatchee N. F. in 1936. He served in the USAF from 1941 to 1946, then rejoined the Wenatchee N. F. in 1947, working as Headquarters Assistant, stationed in Wenatchee, Wn. He also served at other periods as Radio Fireman, Warehousing and Prevention Guard.

In 1951 he was recalled to active duty with the Air Force for the Korean War. After his release he returned to the Wenatchee N. F., to become District Assistant of Lake Wenatchee Ranger District.
