Your column "Up and Down the Avenue," in the August 13 issue of The Enterprise was of some interest to me. It embodies some of the things which are the main problems I see.

In your description of what happened in Disneyland you say that the rights of some 29,000 people were infringed upon by the "hippies." Can anyone of us tell some of the things that we did as teenagers?

In fact, can any of us tell some of the things that we do as adults? Can the kids use us as an example. Who can they look up to?

I think that we'd better be sure that we're not saying, "Do as I say, not as I do." Example has always been the best teacher.

Some of us that have worked with the young people for years are confident in our future which is in their hands.

Also, there is a new sport here, that hasn't been reported yet. The kids are now riding down the North Santiam River on truck inner tubes.

But, they're not burning their draft cards, running to Canada to avoid the draft, hav-

ing love-ins, or damaging public property.

We, in the Canyon area would like everyone to know that we are extremely proud of our young people.
