**School Meet Held Tuesday in Salem**

DETROIT — School board members and administrators of districts whose high schools have 300 or fewer students attended an informational meeting about the Oregon Small Schools' program Tuesday, September 15 at Sacred Heart Academy in Salem. A Title III ESEA federally funded project, the Small Schools Program was statewide and provides assistance to these districts in providing better instruction for their students.

Don Miller of the Oregon Board of Education coordinates the voluntary program.

The Salem meeting was one of 12 to be held in Oregon. Districts invited to attend were Amity, Dayton, Detroit, Falls City, Gaston, Jefferson, Mill City, Mt. Angel Seminary High School, Perrydale, Sacred Heart Academy, St. Paul, Salem Academy, Scio, Sheridan, Valsezt, and Western Menomita.

DETROIT—A Detroit man accused of a July 14 robbery in Salem was sentenced to five years in prison Thursday by Marion County Circuit Judge, Val D. Sloper.

Nicholas Earl Pizer, 23, had pleaded guilty to a charge of robbery by fear July 29. He was arrested by Salem police about 15 minutes after an undetermined amount of money was taken from a clerk at Plaid Pantry, 12th and Fairview Ave S. E. Salem.

IDANHA—An Idanha woman was killed when the car in which she and five other persons were riding rolled over about 4 p. m. Sunday, a half mile west of Detroit Dam.

State police said Mrs. Dorothy Jean Hubbs, 26, was killed when she was thrown from the back seat of the vehicle. Officers said the car, driven by Dwight G. Wasco, 23, Idanha, went out of control and turned over on the highway, hitting a rock bluff.

All five in the car with Mrs. Hubbs were taken to Santiam Memorial hospital, Stayton, where they were treated and released.

Besides Wasco, Mrs. Hubbs' brother-in-law, they were Wasco's wife Kathy, 20, Mrs. Hubbs' widower, Donel, 24, and the two children Tina 5, and Donel Jr. 2.

Police said all occupants of the car live at the old CCC camp at Idanha.

Funeral arrangements are pending at Weddle Funeral Home in Stayton.

Her death was the year's 37th fatality in Marion County and the 87th for the five-county Mid-Willamette Valley area.

**ARE TEACHERS ABOVE THE LAW?**

In a growing number of cities across the nation, school teachers have gone out on strike in clear violation of the law.

Strikes by teachers or any other government employees are fundamentally wrong because they are in fact a direct attack on, and an undermining of, the very reason for government's existence: the provision of public services and maintenance of public stability.

While in some instances grievances of teachers may be real and justified, it is also true that they were aware of the provisions of the law when they voluntarily accepted their teaching appointments. They enjoy many benefits and advantages which are not provided in the private sector. However, a condition of their employment is that they cannot exert the strike privilege.

Teachers have a responsibility not only to themselves but also to the children they teach and the community they serve. It is difficult to see how teachers who walk an illegal picket line can instill respect for law and uphold it in the classroom. Laws are changed by exercise of the right to petition and vote; not by breaking the law by force.
