Permits Needed To Cut Firewood on Forest Service Land

Ever since the word got out a few weeks ago that the public may obtain firewood on National Forest lands, the Willamette Forest has been flooded with telephone calls on how to do it. So here's how:

A \$5 permit will be issued at any of the Forest's seven Ranger Stations, permitting an individual to remove up to 10 cords of wood during a specified period for his personal use. Dates when firewood cutting can be done will be designated by the Ranger, but generally permits will be issued in the Fall and Spring when fire danger is low.

When obtaining the permit, you will be directed to the best areas for obtaining fireplace wood. One word of advice should be issued: The Douglas Fir is a large tree, and a person wanting to cut one up for firewood should have appropriate equipment, including saws, wedges, and a sledgehammer. If using a powersaw, the bar should be at least 24 inches. And if doing the job by hand, you probably should have a two-man crosscut saw.

Film on Vietnam To Be Shown Sun. At Idanha Church

IDANHA—A sound and color 16mm film entitled "Tribes Afflame In Viet Nam" will be shown at the Idanha Community Church on Sunday evening, October 4th at 7:00 p.m. The film is approximately 25 minutes in length and was made following the escalation of the war in 1965.

The film uses for its introduction footage furnished by the United States Army depicting the patrols trying to flush out Viet Cong forces in the villages and the distribution of American relief to the displaced tribal refugees affected by the war in the highlands of Vietnam. It then goes on to portray the normal life and culture of the tribal people of Vietnam and closes with dramatic portrayal of the vigor of the National Evangelical Church in Vietnam.

The film is put together with informal narration which has its appeal for all age groups. It makes a basic missionary appeal for interest in the work abroad and for prayer for the National Church of Vietnam in its day of trial and testing.
