

## More Docks and Overnight Facilities Now on Highway Com. Planning Board

DETROIT — According to Ray Stose, Oregon State Highway Outdoor editor, courtesy docks and overnight moorage facilities are now on the planning board for a number of state parks, many of which are located along side of a lake or bay.

Stose says, that only in a rare case would a booster complain about the excellent quality of the boat ramps the State Highway Division provides at these parks, and that by next summer the boosters will be heaping additional praise on the marine facilities at the state parks because of the added improvements.

He goes on to say the number of docks and completion dates will depend on available funds and manpower for the proposed construction. The courtesy docks will be located alongside the boat ramps to facilitate loading gear and people into and out of the boats in a safe and expeditious manner.

The overnight moorages will be strictly for those boosters who are staying at the parks. Earmarked for the proposed facilities are Detroit Lake Over-

night Camp, courtesy dock and overnight moorage; Devils Lake Day Use Area, courtesy dock; Nehalem Bay, courtesy dock; Bullards Beach, courtesy dock; Washink Lake, courtesy dock; Ochoco Reservoir, courtesy dock; Prineville Reservoir, overnight moorage.

Other docks at state parks will be: The Cove, Palisades (Existing Marina Area); Additional lease moorage; Farewell Bend State Park, courtesy dock; Lake Owyhee, courtesy dock; and launching ramp improvements; and Unity Lake, courtesy dock.

The State Highway Division plans on using the talents and equipment of its own forces for most of the proposed construction.

Stose also said, in defense of the State Highway Division plans for dock construction it should be pointed out that the docks will provide an important safety factor in the reduction of injuries to people and damages to boats. A large number of the campers staying at parks located on navigable waters do bring their own boats.

## State Flag Fund Needs More Money

Secretary of State Clay Myers said today the Oregon State Flag Fund, through which copies of the state flag are sent free to Oregon servicemen, has run out and further requests cannot be filled unless some public contributions are received soon.

Myers appealed for donations from interested citizens and groups to make the fund solvent so that a backlog of requests, particularly from Oregon boys in Vietnam, can be filled.

"We've had generous support in the past from American Legion posts, fraternal groups and a wide number of individuals," Myers said, "and we're hoping that they will help us out once again."

Myers said that since the fund was started in 1966, nearly 2,000 copies of the Oregon state flag have been mailed to Oregon servicemen. The legislature has twice appropriated money to supplement the private donations.

"The thank you letters we have received from our boys overseas are among the most heart-warming I have ever read," Myers said, "and we want to do everything we can to see the fund continued."

Myers said a donation of any size would help. Checks should be made payable to the Oregon State Flag Fund and mailed to the Secretary of State's office, State Capitol Salem, Or.

"We just need a few hundred dollars to tide us over until the next session of the legislature," Myers said, "because I am sure our representatives want to see this worthy project carried on."

## Many Santiam Grads Continue Education

Each year Santiam High School makes a study of students of a particular graduating class. This year the class of 1969 has been chosen for in depth study.

The class had 36 graduates with 23 students taking post high school training which includes Business Colleges, Vocational Schools and four year Academic institutions. This is 64% of the class going on for study of some kind beyond high school, some of these students have finished their training and are successful working at a job as a result of their training.

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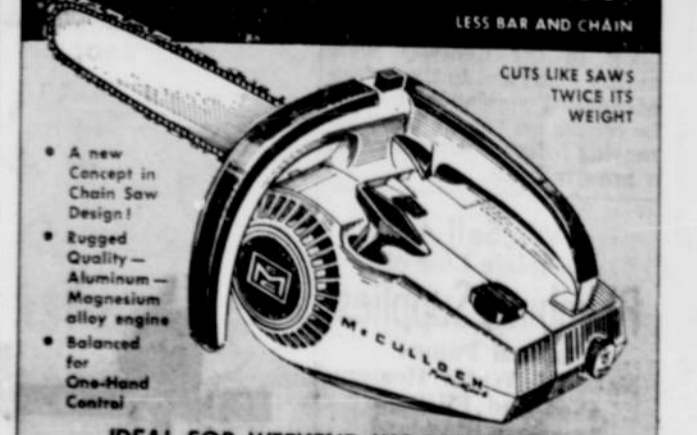

**WAGE FLOOR IS JOB RETARDANT**  
Proposed legislation to amend the wage-and-hour provisions of the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act would harm the people it is designed to help.  
The measure would provide a sharp increase in the minimum wage (56% within two years), causing the loss of established jobs, preventing the creation of new ones, and endangering the economic position of many smaller enterprises.  
It also provides for the minimum wage to be automatically adjusted to the Consumer Price Index. This would compound the financial stress on employer and employee alike, especially in the face of inflation and increased foreign competition.  
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
