Santiam hosted the Regis Rams and lost 57 to 59, Jan. 15, in their second league game of the season.

Santiam out did Regis in the first quarter, 14 to 10, but Regis came back in the second quarter 14 to 8 to end the first half Regis 24 to 22.

The third quarter was a bit different, with both teams netting 16 points. Fourth quarter ended in a tie 51 to 51 so the game went into overtime. In overtime, the Rams netted three field goals and two free throws to make 8 points while Santiam only made three field goals to net 6 points. Santiam lost to Regis 57 to 59.

High scorer was Gary Richards with 17 points and Dan Cox high with 13 rebounds.

Mayor Peck Appoints Committees

Mayor Herb Peck and Councilmen Clyde Phillips, Gerald Caryl and Clyde Bate were sworn into office at the city council meeting held Jan. 12.

The following appointments were made by Mayor Peck: Police Commissioner, Clyde Bate; Street Commissioner, Gerald Caryl; Clyde Phillips, Sanitation; Larry Plotts, Safety and Dale Howell, Building.

The City Council authorized the payment of \$1,598.23 total bills.

More discussion was held regarding property with excessive debris and improper sewer drainage and action will be taken to have the situations corrected.

It was announced that steps are being taken for the possible annexation of the Marsh addition into the City.

The Council voted to again enter the "Area Beautification Contest" this year.

The excessive noise ordinance was discussed and letters will be written to various logging and trucking companies advising them that the City will enforce the ordinance with drivers with inadequate mufflers and noise from exhaust brakes.

The police reported 17 traffic citations and 10 traffic warnings issued for December. There were three adult municipal citations and one juvenile issued, five prisoners lodged and 13 cases processed through Court. Fourteen complaints were reported, 28 incidents and three accidents.

Kindergarten Vote To Be Held April 5

The School Board of District 129J met in regular session Monday evening, Jan. 18.

Under discussion was the auditorium. They were told that the stagecraft would be completed this week and the only item boding things up is the carpeting which was shipped a month ago and should arrive any day.

It was reported that the school district would receive additional money for Title I from the Federal Government.

The budget calendar was set up. An election of whether the kindergarten will be included in the public school system will be held on April 5. At that time, voters will also vote on the school budget.

Councilman Clyde Bate was present and asked the school board for an easement on a parcel of land near the City Hall. Also attending was Rod Pfoertner, who was representing the city.
