Work Smarter . . Not Harder

A good gift for travelers. New in the housewares departments this year is a personal care appliance known as a "steam wand" or "electric hand steamers" that removes wrinkles from garments while on the hanger. They are made by several manufacturers and are available for under \$20.

That handy wooden cutting board in your kitchen can be breeding ground for bacteria that cause food poisoning, warns Mrs. Judith Forest, OSU Extension food and nutrition specialist.

Thorough washing with soap and hot water will remove grease and food particles. To kill germs flood the board with a liberal amount of chlorine bleach solution. Three tablespoons of bleach per quart of water is adequate strength.

Disinfecting the board is important after preparation of raw meat or poultry. Bacteria allowed to remain on boards can be spread to cooked meat, poultry or other foods.

Go where the action is to register a complaint about a garment's performance, advises Elaine Carlson, Extension clothing specialist at Oregon State University. Write to the manufacturer. He's the one that can take the action.

In fact, some manufacturers are now using a guaranteed label on their product. The fine print says if you're not satisfied, return the garment, the sales slip and an explanation of how the garment has been cared for.

Of course, common complaints about shrinkage, color changes, poor construction and pilling aren't valid unless the care instructions on the label were carefully followed. So tell the manufacturer exactly what care you've given the garment.

There needs to be a flow of communication between consumers and manufacturers in order for the consumer to get the kind of product she wants. So don't complain to your husband, friends or relatives—tell the manufacturer—either through the local retailer or by writing directly to the company yourself.

All detergents sold for household use in the United States have been biodegradable since July, 1965. Since this conversion was industry-

wide, it was not thought necessary to label products biodegradable. This has led to some misunderstandings. The conversion to biodegradable products was made without changing the character of existing products. Your favorite brand continued to look and perform the same way.

A biodegradable material is one that can be attacked and broken down by useful bacteria commonly found in sewage, surface waters and soils. After this, it ultimately reverts to carbon dioxide and water.

Use a lazy susan (designed for kitchen cabinets) under your large house plants. This will protect the carpet and also make it easy to turn the plant toward the light from time to time.

These turntables, in plastic, come in a variety of diameters. You can buy them at hardware, variety or department stores.

Confused about which label to believe on bottled diet drinks? Even though cyclamates were removed from all diet drinks as of Jan. 1, 1970, bottles will carry old labels until Oct. 1, 1972, according to Mrs. Judith Forest, OSU Extension food and nutrition specialist. For correct current product information on calorie and carbohydrate content per fluid ounce of diet drink, read the information on the carton and bottle cap.

Elaine Carlson, OSU Extension clothing specialist, gives a helpful hint to those who sew. If twisting and fraying thread frustrates you when threading a needle, try threading as it comes from the spool to prevent going against the natural twist of the thread.

If you run out of dishwasher detergent for your dishwasher, don't try a substitute. Only detergents made especially for dishwashers should be used in the machine. Other types suds too much and slow down washing action, and may be detrimental to the dishwasher itself.

Because the sides and rim around a dishwasher door are sealed off from the dishwashing action, these areas should be suds-cleaned from time to time to remove accumulated residue.

Heavy Rain Was The Weather Report For Upper Canyon Area

DETROIT—Weather report for the week ending at 9 a.m. Tuesday, Jan. 19, 1971, is as follows:

High temperature, 53 degrees on the 17th, against 53 degrees on the 13th in 1970. The low was 17 degrees on the 15th against 36 degrees on that same day last year.

The precipitation was 10.06 inches of rain, with the heaviest fall being 2.32 on the 18th. This topped the same period last year by 2.02 inches.

Thirty inches of snow fell during the week with 13 inches falling on the 14th, at which time 32 inches still remained on the ground. This has since melted to seven inches in open areas.

In sheltered areas (under trees, etc.) the bare ground is visible. During this period last year, we had no snow. There has been considerable rain in the foothills from which the snow is rapidly melting.

A footnote from your reporter: In spite of the accumulation of snow still in the area, daffodils and crocus are making their appearance in sheltered areas. No doubt, if and when the snow melts in the open areas of yards, other early spring plant life will burst forth. A spring robin has also been noted feeding with the usual winter bird families here. What he is doing here this time of year is anybody's guess. Never the less, this touch of spring when we are still jumping over snow banks makes one feel that spring is just around the corner.
