Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Harlan have received a copy of a San Diego newspaper dated January 21, 1971 telling of the "Bank Robber Flees in Leucadia Holdup." Their daughter-in-law, Mrs. Edwin (Anita) Watkins works there as a teller.

The article says "A big bandit who charged in like a bull and robbed the year-old Leucadia branch of Southwest Bank yesterday (Jan. 20) escaped with less than \$5,000. He herder four women employees into a back room and made two male customers lie on the floor while he dumped money from two cash drawers into a large paper bag.

An alarm flashed red on the board in the Encinitas fire station at 2:38 p. m. and the fire chief called the sheriff.

A deputy patrolling at the La Costa rest stop on Interstate 5 received the call at 2:42 p. h. and arrived at the bank three minutes later.

Within minutes sheriffs stationed 15 men at road blocks around the area.

The bank employees were able to give a description of the robber to the officers and the FBI. They said the man carried a long-barreled revolver. Two lady tellers were ordered to place all the money in the bag. The Escrow officer stood up to see what was going on and was ordered into a back room where the third teller was eating her lunch.

Two men customers were ordered to lie on the floor. The branch manager was away on business and unaware of the holdup.

The robber had not been caught when the Harlan's received the notice.

Mrs. Watkins was employed at the U. S. National in Stayton prior to moving to California.
