Another Holdup for Local Folks' Daughter

Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Harlan received word from their daughter-in-law, Mrs. Edwin Watkins from Cardiff By The Sea, Cal., telling of a bank robbery at the Bank where she works at Leucadia, California on January 20.

They have now received another letter telling of another robbery of the same bank on Feb. 8. This time the two men were caught and were identified as James Goetz 36, of Aurora, Ill.; and Leon Boice Mosco, 41 of Chicago, Ill. They were arrested at Oceanside half an hour later. They shot at a man who witnessed the robbery. They escaped with \$3,976 from the holdup but when they were arrested they had \$4,676, \$700 more than was taken from the bank.

The robbers herded the manager and five other persons to the North wall while they emptied cash drawers then forced them into a rear restroom.

One teller triggered the silent alarm and Anita Watkins, the Harlan's daughter-in-law, hid \$2100.00 in the waste paper basket.

Jehovah Witnesses To Meet in Albany

A spokesman for Jehovah's Witnesses from world headquarters in Brooklyn, New York announced plans for a spring circuit assembly to be held in Albany, March 12-14. According to John Woolcock, local presiding minister, the congregation here is among the 17 similar groups in Oregon Circuit No. 4 receiving an invitation to the week-end training session.

The convention, sponsored by the Watchtower Bible and Tract Society of New York, will be held at the Albany High School auditorium. Alvin L. Franck, District supervisor for the Witnesses, will act as chairman and principle speaker, while John W. Stuefloten, Circuit minister, is named general manager for the assembly.
