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Kite Safety Rules Are Published

In Spring, a youngster's fancy turns to thoughts of flying kites. And as the kites "go up" on the March winds, safety warnings "go up" from Pacific Power & Light Company to help keep this happy pastime free from incident.

"There are dangers when children fly kites near electric power lines. A few minutes on the part of the parent to acquaint young kite flyers with the following six common-sense safety rules may avoid a serious accident," cautions Frank Benesh, district manager.

1. Always use dry string, and paper in kites . . . not wire or metallic material. Wire and metal are conductors of electricity and are hazardous.
2. Always fly kites on days there is no rain, as wet string can conduct electricity.
3. Fly kites away from power lines, TV antennas and radio aeriels.
4. Keep away from fallen wires.
5. Call the power company if the kite gets snagged in a power line. Never pull the string or try to climb the power pole.
6. Stay away from busy streets and highways while kite-flying.

Colorful posters illustrating the kite flying safety rules suitable for school bulletin boards or store windows, are available at the local PP&L office.

Mrs. Allen Choate and three sons of Independence were Saturday and Sunday guests at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Wallen.

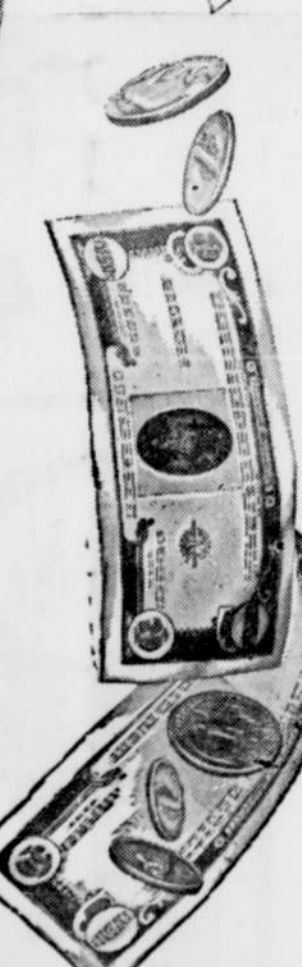
