City of Lyons Levies No Tax To Operate

LYONS — The budget for this city is expected to decline \$2,072 from last year under a proposal from the city budget committee presented this week.

The total budget of \$22,500 included a general fund expenditure of \$9,392.

The city levies no taxes. Operating funds come from allocations from state cigarette, liquor and gasoline taxes.

The council approved annexation of property owned by Bruce Sims, Thomas Hodges and George Nydegger. The men did not object to the annexation, which lies south of the Mehama bridge.

The council announced its intention to pressure property owners to remove old cars from their property, and to enforce regulations requiring skirts around mobile homes.

Nurse Examination To Be Given at Linn-Benton C C

Students interested in taking Linn-Benton Community College's Associate Degree Nursing two-year program may take the required national pre-nursing guidance and aptitude exam on April 24, but must sign up for this examination before April 23, according to Robert Talbott, Director of Counseling.

The test is a requirement not only of Linn-Benton Community College, but is prescribed by the National League for Nursing. The test will be administered again on June 15 through the counseling center on the LBCC campus, and applications may be made through the office of student

personnel services on campus. "Associate Degree Nursing at LBCC is a very demanding program and requires a better than average background in math and science," Talbott stated. "And, it's only one of the health occupations areas available to students at the college. Even if they find it difficult to enter the two-year nursing program, they may decide to investigate a career as a dental assistant through our one-year program, or the 12-week nursing assistant, orderlies and aides program.
