Linn County Building Permits Show Increase

Building permits were up in Linn Co. in March, 1971, compared to March, 1970, the University of Oregon Bureau of Business and Economic Research has reported.

In March, 1971, the total was \$388,750 compared to \$375,250 in the same month last year.

Building permits from 150 identical reporting centers in Oregon totaled \$45,134,844 in March, 1971. This was 13.0% higher than March, 1970.

The state total in March, 1971, included \$28,497,749 for 2,167 new dwelling units; \$8,868,064 was for new non-residential construction, and \$7,769,031 was for additions, alterations and repairs to existing structures.

For the same month last year, the \$39,908,884 total of permits was composed of \$18,974,875 for 1,086 new dwelling units, \$15,460,253 was for new non-residential construction, and \$5,473,756 was for additions, alterations and repairs to existing structures.

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Mrs. C. E. Rogers Attends Alumni Day At OCE in Monmouth

Mrs. C. E. Rogers attended Alumni Day at Oregon College of Education in Monmouth on Saturday, when the leaden box buried in the cornerstone of Campbell Hall 100 years ago was pried open and the contents displayed.

Ellis Stebbins, OCE Dean of Administration emeritus, who is a brother-in-law of Mrs. Rogers, exhumed the contents and speculated with the crowd of about 100 townspeople and alumni on their significance. Included were several quarter dollars; a copy of the Christian Messenger, Willamette Valley religious newspaper current at the time; a few faded pictures; a portrait, weathered almost beyond recognition; a Bible; a newspaper out of Kansas City; the constitution and bylaws of the Monmouth Silver Cornet Band; assorted other papers and mementoes; a 5-cent piece, two silver dimes, one holed, and a U. S. half-dollar of 1871, probably the most valuable of the collection.

The college at Monmouth was founded in 1856 as Oregon Normal school. It became Monmouth Christian College in 1865, and Oregon College of Education in 1939. Mrs. Rogers graduated from there in 1920, a resident of Philomath at the time. She taught for many years in the Mill City Elementary school.

Other former teachers here who attended the ceremonies Saturday were Mrs. Abbie Means Geertson, now a resident of Capitol Manor, Salem; Mrs. Minnie Tatom McMurtry of Philomath; and Mrs. Mary McMurtry Andresen of Eugene. Mrs. Rogers' niece, Miss Jean Stebbins of Salem, drove her and Mrs. Geertson to the festivities from Salem.

Also attending from this locality were Mr. and Mrs. Earl Loucks, both of whom taught for many years in the local school district. Mrs. Rogers attended the 50-year reunion of her class at Monmouth in 1970, and was presented with a picture of Campbell Hall, first permanent building on the campus, taken before the old bell tower fell off.
