### Nephew of Local People Drowns in McKenzie Thursday

One of the men drowned Thursday night in the McKenzie river was Jerald Eugene Howe, 25, nephew of Morris Howe and Clarence Howe of Mill City. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Howe of Veneta.

The body of Donald Rolfe Wells, 37, was recovered from the river below Hayden Bridge Friday afternoon. Howe's body has not been recovered.

The two men, both of Eugene, disappeared in the river near the bridge Thursday night after their boat overturned about one mile north-east of Springfield.

A man and woman drove to a service station after crossing the bridge and reported someone was drowning in the river. An employee of the service station ran to the river and could see the hands of a submerged person floundering in the water about 100 feet upstream from the bridge. He immediately notified the sheriff's office. Later an overturned boat was seen caught in an eddy just below the bridge.

A short time later Mrs. Wells called the sheriff's office and reported her husband was overdue for a fishing trip.

Deputies located Howe's car at Hayden Bridge and Wells' car about 10 miles upstream.

The Howe families are well known in the area as the families have lived here for many years.

Mrs. Joe Lalack and Mrs. Richard Freeman are cousins of the drowned man.

### Complaints On Dogs In Detroit Area

DETROIT — Complaints about dogs running loose in the Detroit area are numerous and is posing a major problem. Dog owners are again being reminded that there is a leash law in the city which prohibits dogs running at large. Contributing to the dog problem are many summer home owners who annually spend their summers here. This increases the already over-populated dog situation in the area, and not only creates a problem for the majority of the citizen's but also headaches for city officials.

Another problem frequently occurring here relates to people who move away leaving their pets behind. This, coupled with the annual dumping off of both unwanted dogs and cats, has developed into a major problem. Included in the ordinance is a "noise clause" which prohibits noise whether it be from howling dogs or fighting cats, or other unnecessary sources.

City officials said Monday they plan to take action on the matter, and that the ordinance will be enforced to the full extent.

### Detroit Area Receives Snow

DETROIT — Weather readings for the week ending May 18, reads as follows: Winter returned for a brief (farewell, we hope) visit during the night of the 15th and 16th and residents awoke to find a fresh covering of snow on the mountains. ### \$1 F.S. Camp Fee Charged After June 1

The Willamette National Forest will begin charging entrance fees to 27 of its 74 campgrounds on June 15, according to Forest Supervisor Zane G. Smith, Jr.

Entrance fees will be \$1 per vehicle, or else by showing a "Golden Eagle" recreation pass. These passes, costing \$10 and good for the rest of 1971, are sold at all offices of the Willamette National Forest.

In addition to entrance fees, 11 of the 27 charge campgrounds will have an additional \$1 per night user fee.

Generally, these 11 campgrounds are those that are most highly developed with facilities such as flush toilets, paved roads, and piped water. Most, too, are closest to popular recreation opportunities.

This leaves 47 campgrounds on the Willamette that will have no fees charged at all. This will give forest visitors opportunity to see new sights and to get away from the crowded conditions that may exist at the more popular sites where the extra camping user fee is charged.

Campgrounds on the Willamette that will require both the entrance fee or Golden Eagle pass and the user fee are: Clear Lake, Hoover, Ice Cap Creek, Islet, North Waldo, Packard Creek, Paradise, Sand Prairie, Shadow Bay, Trout Creek and Whispering Falls.

Those requiring only the entrance fee or pass are: Big Lake, Black Canyon, Blue Pool, Breitenbush, Delta, French Pete, Gold Lake, House Rock, Humbug, Marion Forks, McKenzie Bridge, Olallie, Riverside, Shady Dell, Southshore and Trail Bridge.

Mrs. Curt Benefiel Gets Scholarship

LYONS—Mrs. Curtis Benefiel, the former Eva McBee, special education teacher at Mari-Linn school has been awarded a scholarship for the 1971-72 Experienced Teacher Fellowship Program, at the U of O. The Fellowship program includes a full year of study at the University beginning this June. Supported by the Bureau of Education Personnel Development, a branch of the U. Some of the experiences included in the busy schedule are visits to schools in Oregon and Washington, where experimental projects are in operation. In addition to this the fellowship recipients will carry a normal load at the U of O. All the required courses for a Master's degree will be included in the program.

### Washington Man Killed Saturday Near Lost Lake

DETROIT — Perry Hansell Owens, 24, Coulee Dam, Washington, was killed Saturday when his car skidded, and went over an embankment and overturned on Highway 20 near Lost Lake in the Cascade Mountains, state police said. Owens was found dead in the car at 7:00 a. m. State police said discovery of the car was reported by State Highway Department personnel.

The accident apparently occurred after 2 a. m. Police said. Scene of the accident was in Linn County. Officers said Owen was alone in the car. He was the nephew of Rep. Staf-

ford Hansell, R-Hermiston. Owens' death was the eighth traffic fatality of the year in Linn County and 32nd for the five-county Mid Willamette Valley.

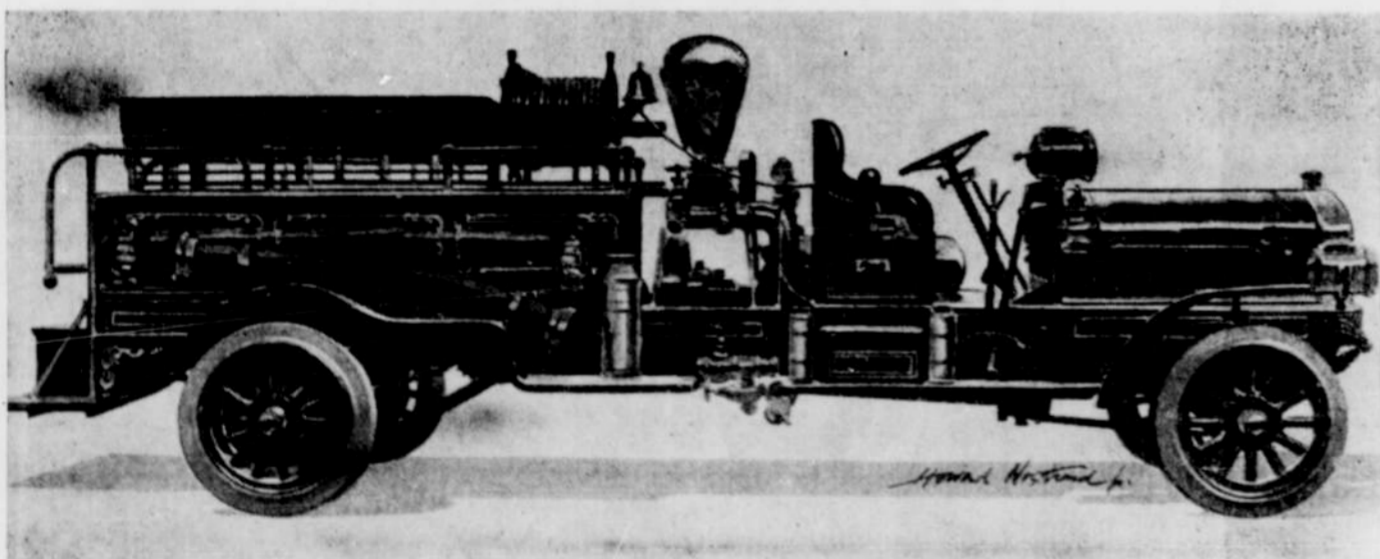
