**Salmon-Steelhead Licenses Due**

The Game Commission today issued a last reminder to sport fishermen to return their expired 1970 salmon-steelhead licenses as required by law. Reino Koski, who maintains records on angler catch of these fish, advised that the deadline is already past but anglers still have a couple of weeks to get these cards back before computation of the catch begins.

Collection boxes are located at all license agencies for the convenience of fishermen, or the cards may be returned directly to the Commission at 1634 S. W. Alder in Portland.

Koski reminded anglers that by returning the expired cards, anglers will be helping management of these valuable fishery resources. The information recorded by anglers on the licenses is used to compute the statewide salmon and steelhead catch as well as the catch by individual stream.

Total salmon and steelhead catch figures for 1970 will be available about midsummer, according to Koski.

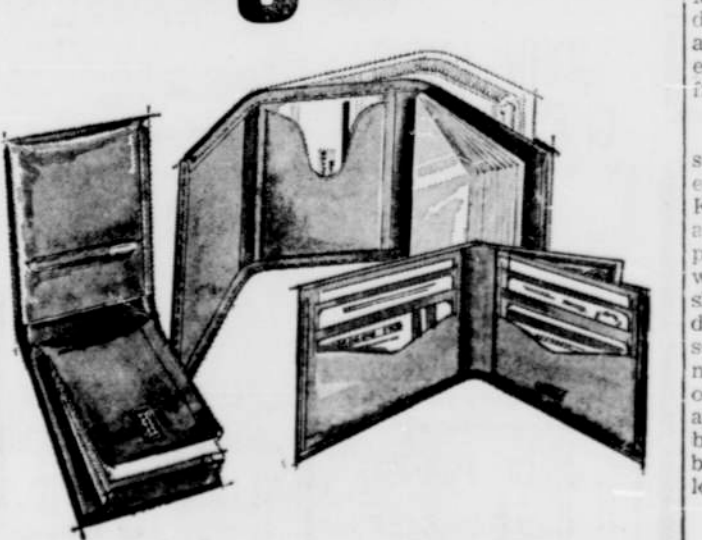
