Tear gas was used to break up the riot but the hotel guests received the full benefit of the tear gas which was very unpleasant. From there they traveled to Paris where they witnessed another protest demonstration. This was over lowering the old age pension from 65 to 60. It took their bus 3 1/2 hours to travel 9 miles.

They report that the trip was marvelous and one they will never forget although they were exhausted and happy to be at home again.
