Detroit District To Hold Timber Sale

DETROIT—Sealed bids will be received by the District Ranger, Detroit Ranger Station, up to and not later than 10:00 A.M. June 25th for an estimated 9,900,000 board feet of Willamette National Forest timber in the Scorpion timber sale.

The sale consists of 7,000,000 bd. feet of Douglas-Fir advertised at \$57.15 per thousand bd. ft. and 2,900,000 bd. ft. of Noble-Fir and other coniferous species at \$21.90 per thousand.

In addition there is within the sale area an estimated 219 acres of all species logs which the bidder is required to purchase at \$159.82 per acre.

The stand is located approximately 14 miles N. E. of Detroit.
