Young & Morgan Get Timber Bid

DETROIT — Young & Morgan, Inc., Mill City, was the apparent successful bidder at \$567,805.00 for an estimated 10,100,000 bf of Willamette National Forest timber, in the Hawkins No. 3 sale, conducted at Detroit Ranger Station Monday morning.

The firm paid \$67.45 per M for 7,500,000 bf of Doug-Fir, 5c above the advertised rate of \$67.40.

Hemlock and other coniferous species sold at the advertised rate of \$34.35 per M; and the cedar sold at \$5.95. Included in the sale was 171 acres of all species logs advertised at \$99.77 per acre.

The stand of timber is located approximately 10 miles west of Detroit on Blowout Road. There were five qualified bidders.

Cedar Sales Held Monday at Detroit

DETROIT — Two Western Red Cedar timber sales with an estimated 450,000 bf of Willamette National Forest timber went on the auction block Monday at Detroit Ranger Station.

Divide Creek Unit No. 1, with an estimated 290,000 bf of timber advertised at \$13.27 per M, sold for \$31 per M. Successful bidder was Hermanson Shake Co., Sisters. Total purchase price was \$899,000. There were four qualified bidders.

Divide Creek Unit No. 2 has an estimated 160,000 bf of Western Red Cedar, advertised at \$11.81 per M, which sold for \$43 per M. Successful bidder was Ronald Train, R & S Roofing, Lebanon.

Purchase price was \$688,000. There were three qualified bidders.

Both sales are located about seven miles south of Detroit.

The money was easy taking, she knew; But then came along a boy named Sue.

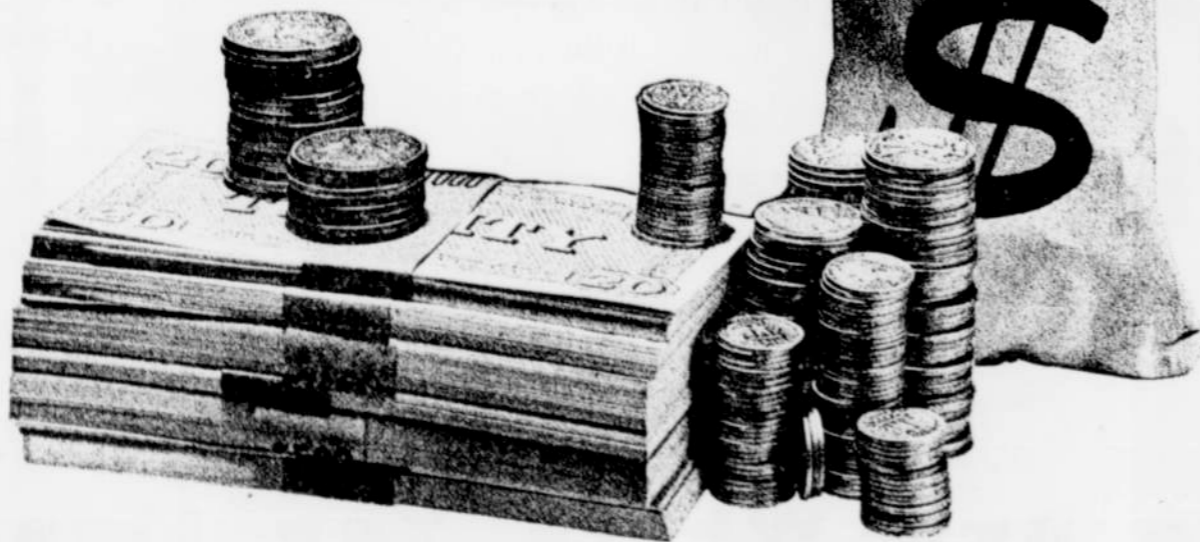
When they met, it was marriage; Into the sunset with a horse-drawn carriage.

When the roughest and meanest woman in the land With a name like Savage Sam Meets with a boy, whose name is Sue,

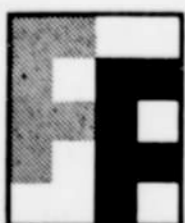
