Postal Service Day Observed By Local Post Office

Postal Service Day was observed at the Mill City Post Office by an open-house on Thursday morning, July 1, when a large cake appropriately decorated in red, white, and blue and coffee were served

to the public. Postmaster and Mrs. Charles Kelly hosted the affair.

Large, printed replicas of many famous stamps decorated the wall of the post office lobby, adding color to the event, as did the new flag and various posters. The new 8c stamp was made available, carrying the emblem of the United States Postal Service—a stylized eagle poised for flight. A limited number of souvenir envelopes were given out, as well as cancelled first day covers which were available for the cost of an 8c stamp.

This special day marked the end of nearly 200 years of service to the American people by the United States Post Office Department, its place officially taken by a new organization, the United States Postal Service, an independent establishment of the government formed to meet the changing needs of our growing society. Providing better, faster, more dependable mail service will be the challenge of the Postal Service in the months and years ahead.
