Rhonda Gossett was at the guest book and Carolyn Wells was in charge of the gift table. Both are from Turner.

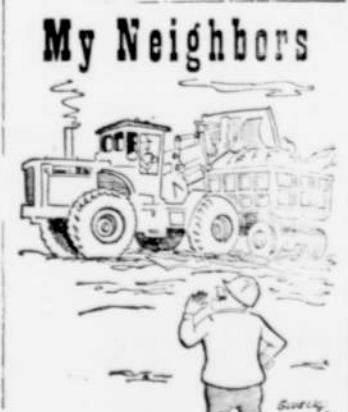
Following a wedding trip to Canada, the newlyweds will be at home in Aumsville. Mr. Crawford is employed at North Santiam Plywood in Mill City.
