The children of Mr. and Mrs. Ramon L. Roberts of Lebanon, former long-time residents of Mill City, are inviting their friends to attend a reception in honor of their 50th wedding anniversary from 2 until 5 o'clock, Sunday afternoon, September 19, in the Fellowship Hall of the Presbyterian church. The couple requests that there be no gifts.

Also receiving the guests will be Luella Jean Binkley of Arleta, Calif., daughter of the late Ramon Roberts, Jr. The mother of Mrs. Roberts, Pearl E. Alice Imogene Shimmin and Remon Luell Roberts were married at Philomath on September 20, 1921 in the home of Rev Tibbetts of the United Brethren church. The reception was held at the home of the bride's parents in Corvallis.

The Roberts' first home was in Camp #14 of the Hammond Lumber Company at Mill City where he was employed. The couple made the trip to camp in the cab of a locomotive (Shay,) with Walt James as the engineer and Adrian Bean as the conductor. They moved from camp to Mill City in September, 1925.

Mr. Roberts was stricken with paralysis on October 8, 1925 at their home on S. W. Ivy Street where they lived until June, 1962, and where he maintained a shoe repair shop for a number of years.

President of the Mill City Volunteer Firemen for several years in the 1940's, Mr. Roberts also served two terms on the Mill City Board of Education, and a few years on the school budget committee. He was elected to the first Mill City council upon incorporation of the city in July, 1947.

In 1962 Mr. and Mrs. Roberts moved to Sweet Home where they lived two and a half years before buying their present home in Lebanon in November, 1964. They are members of the American Legion and Auxiliary Post #51 in Lebanon.

Besides their three living children, the Roberts have nine grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.
