Mill City Woman's Club Observes 50th Anniversary Here Tuesday

Over 100 clubwomen and friends from 15 Oregon towns and cities, as well as Long Beach, Calif., helped the Mill City Woman's Club observe its 50th anniversary at Fellowship Hall Tuesday afternoon, be a huge success. Representatives from Hubbard, Silverton, Seio, Salem, Eugene, Corvallis, Sublimity, Lebanon, Gates, Aumsville, Stayton, Meham, Lyons, Forest Grove and Portland were in attendance. Among distinguished guests were Alice M. Lawrence second Vice President of the Oregon Federation of Women's Club from Eugene; Mrs. I. O. Williamson of Hubbard, President of the Fourth District Federation; Mrs. Walter B. Rich of Portland, past president of the OFWC.; Mrs. John S. Tyler, Jr., of Salem, also a past president of OFWC.; and Mrs. Richard L. Schaefer of Lebanon, first vice president of the Oregon Federation. Receiving special recognition and presented with corsages were five charter members of the Woman's club which was organized in 1921. They included Edith Mason and Lettie Swan, both still active in club work, and Blanche Kelly, all of Mill City; Alice Knott of Portland, and Lettie Gentry of Salem at whose home the club was started. Notes were received from Violet Gordon of Klamath Falls, also a charter member, as well as from Mae Cooper of Springfield, an early member. A brief but impressive memorial was conducted for the charter members who have passed away, with a candle be-

ing lighted and a white carnation being placed in a bouquet at the reading of each name by Doris Rogers of Gates. Sixteen past presidents of the Club were introduced and presented with corsages. They included Mrs. C. S. Knott (1923-23), Edith Masson (1926-27), Lottie Gentry (1927-28), Mabel Schroeder (1934-35), Vivian Hoening (1935-36), Alberta Smith (1939-40), Doris Sheythe (1944-45), Edna Ross (1949-51), Sue Mikkelsen (1951-52), Goldie Rambo (1952-53), Nell DeWitt (1954-56), Virginia Mason Hoeye (1958-59), Elaine Russell (1962-63), Sylvia Duncan (1964-66), Marle Tolbert (1966-68), and Ruth Cummings (1968-70). Edith Mason also served three additional years in recent times, and Goldie Rambo served last year. The 1971 president, Antonia Thomas, acted as mistress of ceremonies, giving the welcome, introducing the guests, and announcing the program. The serving table was covered with a green cloth, centered with the appropriately decorated cake, and flanked by green tapers in ornate gold candelabra with prisms. The side table for the punch bowl was covered with a gold lace cloth, graced with a gorgeous arrangement of red roses, and with votive candles burning in red holders. Attractive arrangements of dahlias, roses, and daisies in gold containers were placed at strategic points. Miniature bouquets of yellow flowers centered the small tables at which the guests were seated. A short musical program and brief historical data of the year 1921 was presented by Doris Sheythe, assisted by Edna Ross and Helen Cox. Among numbers sung by the trio, with Mrs. Sheythe playing the piano accompaniment, were "Naughty Waltz," "Let the Rest of the World Go By," "Ain't We Got Fun," "Peggy O'Neill," "Look for the Silver Lining," and "Toot-Toot-Tootsie, Good-Bye." Mrs. Sheythe also played two solos, "Sweet and Low," and "In the Gloaming," on the viola, the instrument having been made by the late W. H. "Mode" Davis. Interim piano music was played during the afternoon by Virginia Hoeye of Corvallis. The afternoon's program came to a conclusion with the reading of the Woman's Club's 50-year history by Mary Kelly. Food Stamp Meet Set for Grocers

The United States Department of Agriculture has scheduled orientation meetings for Marion and Polk County retail grocers who plan to participate when the Food Stamp Program begins in both counties October 1. The 3 p. m. meetings will be held at the Northwest Natural Gas auditorium, 3123 Broadway N. E., Salem, September 15 and 23, Polk County Court House, Dallas, September 16, and Woodburn City Hall, September 20. Francis B. Reagan, food stamp officer in Portland for USDA's Food and Nutrition Service, said food merchants must be authorized before they may accept food coupons. The authorization, for which there is no charge, can be made at any of the meetings. Applications to participate have been mailed to all known grocers in both counties. Reagan said grocer cooperation is vital to success of the Food Stamp Program. Grocers operating on the Linn County side of Mill City will be able to sell to people who reside on the Marion County side of town officials said here Thursday. Slash Burning Starts in Area

DETROIT — The Detroit Ranger District of the Willamette National Forest began their annual slash burning program Friday, with the burning of one unit of some 32 acres in the Lucky Butte area. Acting Fire Control Officer, Dick Gassner said Monday two more units consisting of some 60-acres is slated to be burned Tuesday providing weather conditions permit. Total acreage of slash to be burned is estimated at 798 acres in 33-clear cut units. Gassner said, of this total acreage, probably only 500-acres will be burned this fall. Other sites on the district yet to be burned are Stony Ridge in the Little North Fork area, Breitenbush Drainage, Blowout Drainage and Coopers Ridge. Acreage in these locations will range from four to 60 acres, Gassner said. Slash burning is done by the Forest Service with the assistance of some logging firms.
