New Deal on Drivers Licenses

An Oregon driver who has had his license suspended for any reason must now pay a \$2 fee before the license can be reinstated.

The new fee was authorized by the 1971 Legislature. It is to be applied to the cost of preparing and serving notices of suspension or revocation. About 50,000 drivers are suspended each year, according to the Motor Vehicles Division.

The law also was changed to require the agency to deliver suspension notices by certified mail or, at the option of the division, by personal service. It also provides that refusal of service is prima facie evidence of receipt of notice.

Forest To Be Open For Doug Fir Cones Only; Fee Required

The Detroit Ranger District of the Willamette National Forest will be open to the public for picking Douglas-fir cones ONLY. A commercial contract is being let for collection of all other species.

A \$5 permit is required for picking cones on National Forest Land. Picking is not allowed within campgrounds. People are urged to locate their own market for the cones as the district is not buying any Douglas-fir seed this year.
