Bill Gehlen Present At Gates Meeting

GATES—The regular Gates City council met September 16. Present were Mayor Lorraine Mills, councilmen Marvin Edwards, Bert Wells, Bernice Evans, Jerry Kazunas and Delbert Neal. Visitors were City Attorney William Gehlen; Ruth Edwards, John Lengacher, Habel Gabriel and Cam Steckete.

Mr. Gehlen was present to answer a few questions on the water situation. This is not a public utility and the city is not obligated to put water anywhere. The city is not financially able to put in new lines and it would be possible for new hookups to be made on a permissive user permit, which means the user would put in the line at his expense, to the city code, with the understanding that in case of a water shortage, they might be shut off.

John Lengacher appeared at the meeting to see if he could get city water at Canyon Apartments. He also asked for a business license application. It was suggested that the city get an active planning commission working again. Attorney Gehlen says more revenue would be available to the city.

The Ann Simko easement was received this week. Jerry Kazunas said he had increased the chlorine content in the water to keep the level up to safety.

Approval to open Louisa street to the highway was received from the Highway department. Delbert Neal was asked to check on the cost.

Following discussion it was decided that the Frontier Trailer Park would pay the same rates as everyone else. The next meeting will be October 21 at City Hall.

Detroit Businesses To Obtain Licenses

DETROIT — At the regular meeting of the Detroit City Council an ordinance was passed which will require all business houses in the city to obtain a business license. This has been discussed at council meetings since April, with various businessmen sitting in on the council. The license fee will be retroactive as of September 1, 1971.

License applications may be obtained at the office of the city recorder during business hours on Thursdays and Saturdays.

Other business included a discussion on the use of plastic hose water hookups. According to city officials, a state code prohibits the use of plastic hose water hookups to cabins or summer homes under 120-PSL and, that stand pipes cannot be within 10 feet of the structure. Plastic standpipes are not acceptable, officials said.
