Nationwide Survey On School Enrollment To Be Held Here

What is the school enrollment in the United States this fall?

John E. Tharaldson, Director of the Bureau of the Census Data Collection Center in Seattle, announced today that a number of households in this area will help to provide the answer when they are interviewed by Census Bureau representatives during the week of October 18-22.

The questions on school enrollment and related subjects such as living arrangements of college students will be in addition to the usual ones asked in the monthly survey on employment and unemployment conducted nationwide by the Bureau for the U. S. Department of Labor.

The October 1970 survey showed that 60.4 million persons from ages 3 to 34 years were going to school, from nursery school to college. This was 56 percent of the U. S. population. Of the 29.3 million in this age group not enrolled in school, 27 percent were high school graduates.

The monthly survey of the labor force provides a continuing measure of economic conditions in the country. The August survey found that both employment and unemployment had risen, as the labor force increased sharply. Unemployment, on a seasonally adjusted basis, edged up to 6.1 percent of the labor force, from 5.8 percent in July.

Information supplied by individuals participating in this survey is kept strictly confidential and results are used only to compile statistical totals.
