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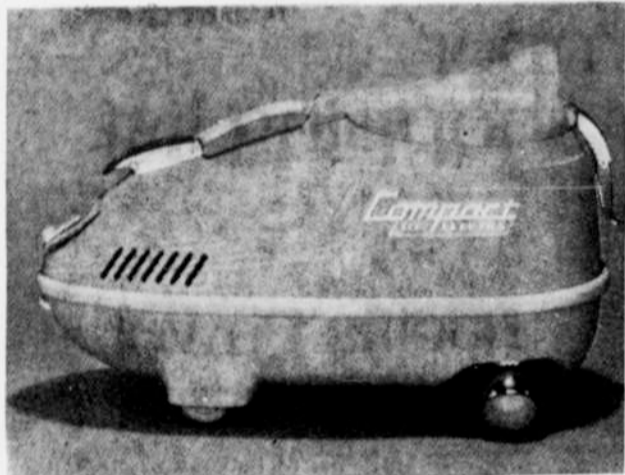
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Report to the People from Santiam Memorial Hospital

What are the responsibilities of the trustees and board of directors of the hospital?

The governing board of our community hospital represent the people of the community. They are the essence of our voluntary, non-profit hospital system. The citizens on the board of the hospital serve without pay, out of a sense of civic service and pride, to make better hospital care available to the community.

They are chosen for their demonstrated leadership and their willingness to devote skill, time and thought to the Santiam Memorial Hospital. Their leadership carries with it a final responsibility for the quality of medical care which is provided in the hospital, the appointment of medical staff members, and the appointment of the hospital administrator who is in turn responsible for the effective operation of the offices. They also determine the extent of the services to be provided by the hospital, the protection of the community investment in it, and the prudent use of the hospital assets and income.

What does the board of trustees do?
The board sets the broad policies under which the medical staff and the administrative procedures are developed. It meets regularly to review the reports of the medical staff and of the administrative departments. Committees of the board review, discuss and recommend policy to specific aspects of hospital operation

and planning. The board sets the policies, explains them to the community so the community understands them and seeks the community support. In turn it adapts the hospital program and policies to meet the community needs. It works with the community agencies for coordinated and comprehensive health services.

It seeks ways to strengthen the hospital's finances through broadening and extension of pre-payment which makes it possible for hospital bills to be paid without financial difficulty to the patient, and through adequate payment by government for hospital bills and for welfare payments, thus avoiding hospital deficits. It seeks efficient management and effective use of the hospital's facilities and service, so that the community will gain the maximum benefit of the hospital.

The general policies of the governing board are:

To determine the policies of the institution with relation to the community needs.

To see that professional standards are maintained in the care of the sick.

To coordinate the professional interests of the hospital with administrative, financial and community needs.

To provide adequate financing both as to securing a sufficient income and as to enforcing business like control of expenditures.

To direct the administrator of the hospital to carry out the above policies.

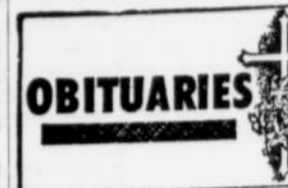

Services were held on Monday at 2:30 at the Kale funeral home in Winterset, Iowa with interment at the Peru, Iowa cemetery.

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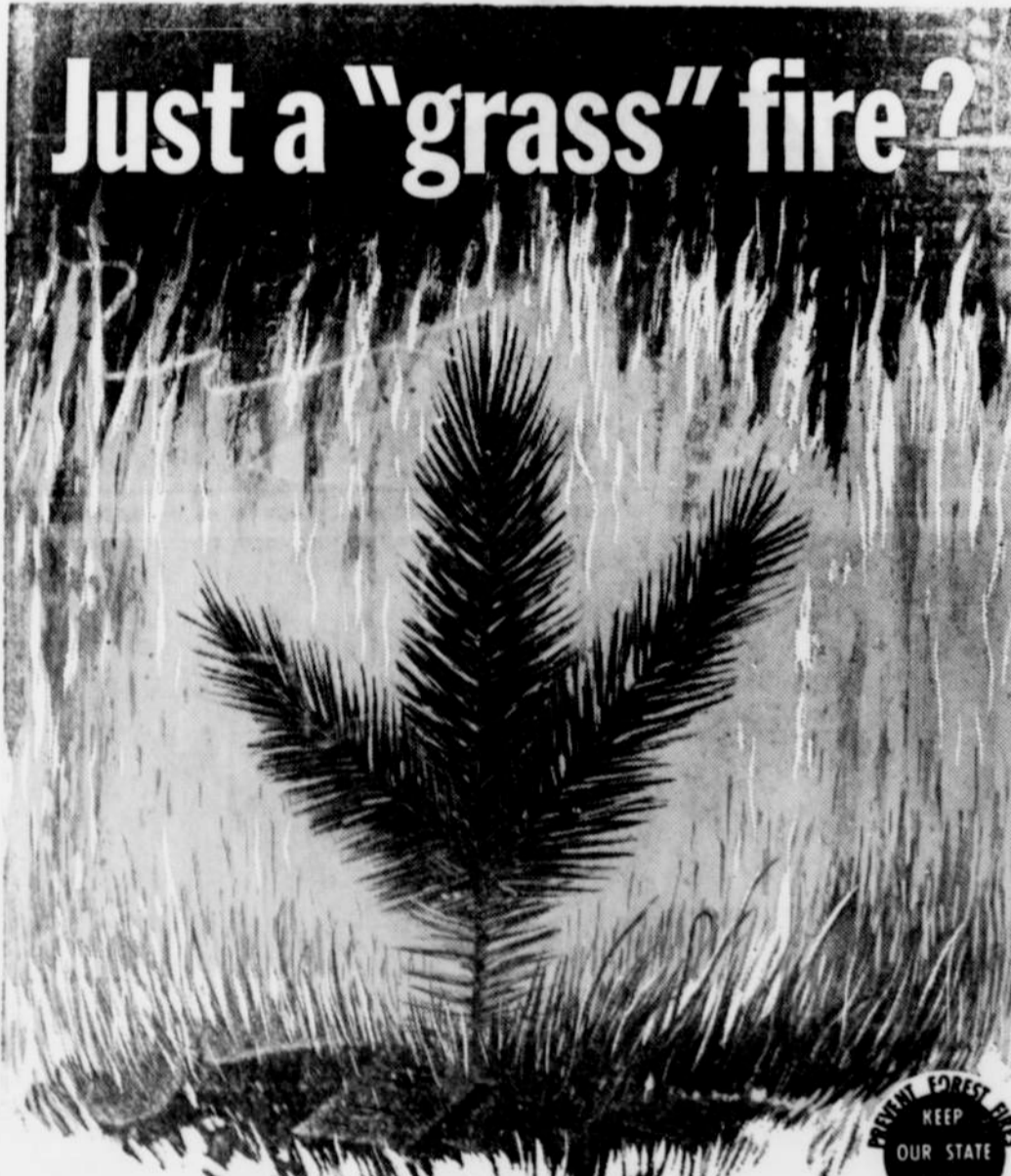
