DID YOU KNOW? Bicycles have been around since the 1850's and caused quite a disturbance. In 1885 the Salem city council passed an ordinance requiring the bicyclist to stop when within 100 yards of an approaching team of horses. There were several styles of bicycle, and especially, popular was the one with the 66 inch front wheel and 14 inch rear wheel. Three Jefferson men paid \$160 each for this kind, which they rode home from Portland and proudly displayed to neighbors. The "safety" bicycle, with 2 wheels of equal size proved most enduring. It was very much like the one used today with the exception of different tire treads. The romantic bicycle-built-for-two

was a popular adaptation of this design.

Bowlers To Qualify For Bowl Down Cancer Tournament

The qualifying round for the statewide Bowl Down Cancer competition is now underway, to be completed by Oct. 23. The event, a benefit for the American Cancer Society's Oregon division, is jointly sponsored by the society and the Oregon State Bowling Proprietors Assn.

An estimated 30,000 men and women bowlers throughout Oregon are expected to participate in the event, which has raised \$133,772 for the cancer society during the past 5 years. The bowlers will compete

for over 50 donated prizes, including Volkswagen sedans for the winners in the men's and women's divisions. The cars have been donated by Volkswagen Dealers of Oregon and the bowling proprietors group.

A 50-cent contribution to the cancer society must accompany entries for the qualifying round, and persons may enter as many times as they wish. League bowlers are the only ones eligible to compete, however.
