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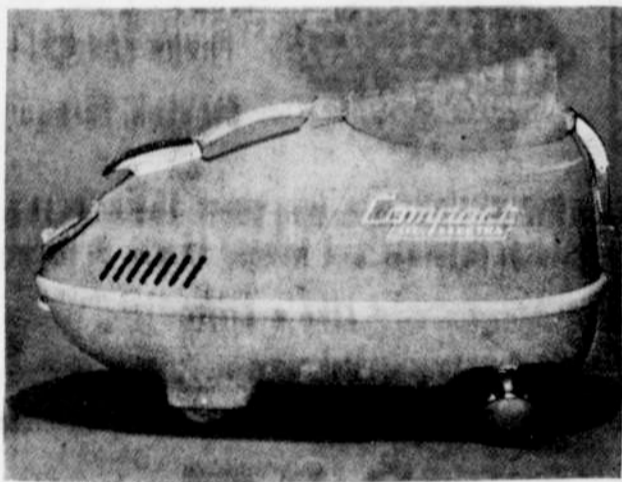
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## Local Credit Union Continues To Grow

## Water Skiing Taught In Detroit High School

DETROIT — The following article recently appeared in the Northwest Rurallite and we think it worth repeating:

When Detroit High School physical education teacher, Elaine Hopson, decided to revolutionize her P. E. program to include two water skiing classes this fall, she didn't realize the full slate of educational experiences she was offering the 23 girls who eventually took the course. She had long believed that the smooth, blue water of Detroit reservoir should be used, like other resources in the area, by her school in developing a varied, interesting curriculum. So water skiing, although no other high school in Oregon offered it, seemed natural. Mrs. Hopson didn't, however, figure that her girls would get short courses in: (1) Survival (besides recuperating from some Hollywood stuntman type crashes on the water, the girls have learned to survive cold, wind and rain in their attempts to complete their water skiing classes); (2) Underwater plant and sea life (many of the girls have spent more time under water than gliding across it); (3) Patience and self control (determined, most girls fought on after many unsuccessful attempts to stand erect on their skis and by the third week most had their water wings.)

"I've thought about teaching water skiing in years past, but my classes were too big," Mrs. Hopson said. "This year I only have a dozen girls or so in each class so skiing became a possibility."

Mrs. Hopson sought approval of Detroit high school principal Ronald Wilkerson prior to the opening of school this year. He gave the program his immediate approval, noting that it was as important to teach water skiing, a sport many students will continue to enjoy long after high school, as any other intramural or competitive sport. Perhaps more so in the case of Detroit High, located in an area where boating is a way of life.

"We checked with the Oregon Schools Activities association to see if there would be an extra insurance charge, but found the students were covered under our regular policy," Mr. Wilkerson said. "As for other expenses, we merely pay for the gas used in the boats. The boats and other equipment are furnished by Mrs. Hopson and folks in the community."

Will water skiing become a regular P. E. course at Detroit high school? "The girls all seemed to enjoy it and we know it's a valuable course for this community," Wilkerson said. "Of course, the size of classes determines somewhat which programs will work best, so we'll have to see how things go this year before deciding on the future."

Will the boys at Detroit high strike for equal rights?

"The fellows have a pretty full agenda of P. E. and sports program now," Mr. Wilkerson said. "Of course, it's always possible that we could have a water skiing class for boys, too."

Any reaction from parents? "A couple have offered to loan their boats—the overall reaction has been favorable."

Reaction from skier, Georgina White: "It's groovy, I didn't think I could ever get it, but I finally did and now it's a ball."

This unusual program is thought to be the only high school water skiing program taught in Oregon.
