Huntington Beats Detroit Saturday

DETROIT—The Huntington Locomotives, with the reputation of being the best 8-man football team in the state the last three years, claimed an unprecedented 4th straight championship and extended their current winning streak to 48 games as they came from behind to beat Detroit 42-32 here Saturday. Both teams were evenly matched, the difference being the Locomotives' powerful running duo of Ken Ball and Shane Kanyid, and 5-key pass interceptions by the Locomotives' defensive squad.

The Cougars momentarily stunned Huntington when, on the opening kickoff, Tom Leming booted a perfect onside kick. With the ball bouncing crazily on the rain soaked turf, Rick Monroe finally recovered the ball on the Huntington 35-yard line. On the first play of the game, quarterback Tom Leming hit Don Hiebert with a perfect toss and Hiebert waltzed into the end zone untouched. Dennis Benton ran over the point after and the Cougars led 8-0 with only 22 seconds elapsed. Shane Kanyid scored Huntington's first touchdown on a 3-yard plunge with 7:20 left to play in the first quarter and the score was tied 8-8.

With only 12 seconds left in the opening stanza, Rick Roth caught a 15-yard pass from Leming for another touchdown, which culminated a march of nearly 65 yards. During the second quarter the lead changed hands several times as the Cougars scored once more while the Locomotives were scoring three times. Hiebert caught another Leming aerial for the Cougars for 6 points and Rick Roth and Dave Stevenson tackled Jim McLean in the Huntington end zone for a 2-point safety. For Huntington, Randy Griffin caught an 8-yard pass for one score and Dan McCoy and Ken Ball had 2- and 5-yard plunges for the other scores. At half-time, the Locomotives held a slim 2-point advantage 26-24.

On the second half kickoff, Detroit moved the ball up to the 45-yard line and with two

first downs, behind some fine running from Dennis Benton and Rick Monroe had the ball on the 17-yard line. With one yard needed for a first down, Leming tried a quarterback sneak and wound up in the end zone for the Cougar's last score of the day and a short-lived lead of 32-26. Ken Ball had a 9-yard run for a touchdown in the same quarter for the Locomotives and led 34-32 at the end of the third stanza.

The last quarter proved fruitless for the Cougars as they had two passes intercepted and also lost the ball on a fumble on the Huntington 3-yard line. Meanwhile the Locomotives running attack got going as they picked up 123 yards and one touchdown on a run by Shane Kanyid which covered 30 yards.

Detroit's last drive stymied with 3½ minutes left in the game and Huntington ran out the clock by moving the ball on the ground.

About 500 people watched the game during periods of rain and very muddy field conditions. For the Cougars, it marked the highest place finish ever achieved by any of its athletic teams in playoff competition.

The final statistics showed the Locomotives leading in total yardage 327-324 and in first downs 18-16. Dennis Benton led the Detroit runners with 113 yards in 19 carries. He also caught a screen pass in the fourth quarter that covered 35 yards. For Huntington, Shane Kanyid collected 168 yards in 25 carries and Ken Ball ran for 136 yards in 26 carries. Ball is the only senior on the team's starting lineup. Detroit was way ahead in passing yardage, 196-49. Five seniors made their last appearance for the Cougar football squad. They are Dennis Benton, Ben Grant, Don Hiebert, Rick Nickles and Dave Stevenson.
