The incidence of cancer in blacks is substantially higher than in whites, particularly among males, reports a preliminary study made by the National Cancer Institute.

Infrared thermography, a new diagnostic tool, can safely, painlessly, accurately and quickly detect health problems, as varied as migraine headaches; a malignant tumor, or acute appendicitis says Dr. Margaret Abernathy of Georgetown University Medical Center. The thermograph picks up infrared heat rays from the body and converts them to a visual temperature reading. A complete thermogram is available in 1/2 second.

Weather Reports To Again Be Featured

DETROIT—Request has been made that your weather observer again supply weekly reports during the winter months. Hence, the following report for the period starting Monday, December 6, 1971 to and including Monday, Dec. 13th with comparative reports for 1970, during the same period.

The high temperature during the week for 1971 was 48 degrees on the 8th, against 44 degrees on the 10th in 1970. The low, 24 degrees on the 7th against last years low of 16 degrees on the 7th.

The precipitation (melted snow and rain) for the week in 1971 was 8.11 inches, against 1.67 inches in 1970.

The total snowfall for this year during this period, was 21.30 inches. No snow fell during this period last year, although 21 inches had fallen on the 1st, 2nd and 3rd of the previous week last year, which had gradually melted until only 2-inches remained on the ground at the end of the week.

At present, 14 inches of snow remains on the ground. Gustly winds during the early part of the week strewed lawns and streets with many small branches (and a few not so small) and there were two power outages, each of which lasted only a short time. Streets and highways are clear, thanks to our busy snowplows, but there seems to be a powerful lot of slush underfoot.

In the Marion Forks area, the following report for the same week was prepared by Howard Drago, weather observer, Oregon State Fish Hatchery. High temperature for the week was 43 degrees on the 9th, low temperature 20 degrees on the 8th. Total precipitation (melted snow and rain) was recorded as 6.06.

Total snow on the ground as this report is being made is 38 inches.
