According to the U.S. Center for Disease Control, there may be as many as 640,000 female carriers of gonorrhea in the U.S. that are carriers without symptoms.

Don't take aspirin if you are drinking cocktails, wine, or beer, says Dr. H. W. Davenport of the U. of Michigan Medical school. In experiment with dogs and humans he has shown that alcohol in the stomach enhances the ability of aspirin to damage and break down the stomach's inner lining. This can lead to bleeding and stomach ulcers.

Use caution with medication prescribed or given to animals. They are usually given by veterinarians in envelopes, bottles and other containers marked only with directions for use. Parents often do not realize the potential hazards of such drugs if they are left where children can get to them.
