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Saalfeld's Return From Six Week Vacation Trip

Mr. and Mrs. Ben H. Saalfeld recently returned from a six-weeks' trip to Australia and New Zealand and report a marvelous time. They left San Francisco, Calif. on the USS Mariposa on which they spent 16 days, the first stop being Morea Island on French Polynesia, the passengers going ashore on a launch.
Returning to the ship, an hour's sailing took them right into the harbor at Papeete, Tahiti, where they spent several days, having very little difficulty due to the French language being spoken.
From Papeete, it took four days by ship to Auckland, New Zealand, where the visitors disembarked for a few days, crossing the South Island to visit Wellington at the other tip where sea-going ships come in.
A one-day ride on a large ferry-boat took the tour group to the North Island where they saw many sheep and other animals. During several days there, the city of Christ Church was visited with its many cathedrals and where the Church of England dominates, then on to the town of Dunedin. Returning to the airport at Christ Church, the Saalfelds flew to Sydney, Australia, from where they took many side-tours including a huge sheep ranch where they watched them working the sheep dogs. Of special interest was a trip to Lion Safari, "Little Africa," as the temperature and topography are so much like that continent, where the bus drove through the seven-acre fenced-in area where the wild animals roam about. At a National Park, they viewed the Koala bear, the kangaroo, and the Emu, to name a few.
The temperature of around 106 degrees in the bush country of the interior kept the tour from visiting that section where there are many Aborigines (bushmen), but they saw a few of the better-dressed and educated ones in the cities.
The Miori natives of New Zealand were described as very attractive people. As it was the Fall season there, the people were harvesting apples, grapes, and other crops. New Zealand was said to be more British, and with lower buildings, than Australia which has many high-rise structures and where there is more of a "melting pot" of people, including Greek, German, Italian, and Jewish sections of town with different cuisine.
It was stated by Mrs. Saalfeld that the men in Australia wore their hair quite long, there being many hair dressing and wig shops for men, but that the young girls and women wore their skirts very short, as they also did in New Zealand. The advertisements read that "practically all the men in America wear wigs." However, Mr. Saalfeld was able to get a haircut at a regular barber shop for one dollar.
The newspapers told of increasing riot conditions in Melbourne, Australia, especially in connection with the campus at the University, although there was practically no rioting reported in New Zealand. The many large memorials to war veterans were noticed in the parks and city squares and drew much attention.
Mrs. Saalfeld remarked that due to the absence of spinning mills, the women's panty hose had to be imported from England, so were quite expensive, usually about \$7. Other items of clothing, however, were cheaper than here. The devaluation of the American dollars made them worth about \$81
