DETROIT — Weather readings for the week ending at 8 a.m. March 20, 1972, with comparative readings for 1971 are as follows.

The highest temperature was 77 degrees on the 16th. The low was 33 degrees on the 19th.

Precipitation for the week was 41 inches. No snow fell during this period, and none remains on the ground, with only a little showing on the tops of the mountains in our area. We were treated to three beautiful sunny days.

During the same period in 1971, the highest temperature was 58 degrees on the 20th, with a low of 22 degrees on the 18th. The precipitation (melted snow and rain) was .85 inches, with a snowfall of 3:50 inches with eight inches from previous falls remaining on the ground. The 19th and 20th were sunny days, with no precipitation, but heavy frosts covered the ground during the night, but were soon dissipated by the sun.

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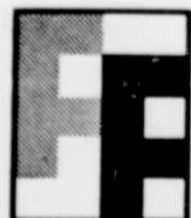
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
