The Needlecraft magazine for March, 1972 was featuring fish in their food section and included the following recipe for fish hash. Combine two cups of diced cooked potatoes with one cup of any leftover fish (a salt fish is best.) Add 2/3 cup of any cooked, diced vegetables such as beets or carrots, or small peas. Cook two slices of cubed salt pork in a hot iron skillet for about three minutes. Remove the pork, moisten the fish and vegetables mixed with 1/4 cup of milk, turn into the hot fat in the pan and cook slowly, covered, until heated through (about 1/4 hour.) Uncover and brown on bottom—turn out like an omelet. This about serves eight but is easily halved for a family of four.

will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. o'clock.

This election is to be held for the purpose of submitting to the voters of the Idanha Rural Fire Protection District the question of whether or not the tax base in the sum of \$1,425.65 now in effect in the Idanha Rural Fire Protection District of Marion-Linn Counties, Oregon, shall be increased to a new base of \$11,000.00, for the purpose of providing: (1) A budget to meet current operating requirements. (2) To eliminate the requirement for special elections. (3) To take care of increased costs for repair and maintenance. (4) Other miscellaneous increased costs.

If this measure is approved, the Idanha Rural Fire Protection District's operating budget of \$7,455.00 to be financed by the local taxes for the tax year of 1972-73 will be \$5,934.95 less than the operating budget of \$13,389.95 financed by local taxes for the preceding year.

This proposed tax base increase will be submitted to the voters in accordance with Article XI, Section 11 of the Constitution of the State of Oregon.
