June Has 14 Days Of Sunny Weather

DETROIT—The following is the monthly weather reading for June 1972, together with comparative readings for the same period a year ago.

The high temperature of the month was 86 degrees on the 29th. The lowest was 37 degrees on the 9th, with an average mean of 59 degrees. There were 14 days of complete sunshine and eight days of partial sunshine. The balance were cloudy or rainy. The total rainfall was .93 inches with the greatest fall being .38 inches on the 10th. June of last year was a different story. The highest temperature was 87 degrees on the 21st with the lowest being 35 degrees on the 26th, and an average mean of 64 degrees. There were only 9 sunny days and on the 17th and 18th, gusty winds prevailed. The total rainfall was 3.02 inches with the extreme fall being 1.65 inches on the 24th. Total precipitation for the year to date is 62.04. Data by Irene Paullin, Detroit weather observer.

Fishermen's Bend Fee Set at \$2

A charge of \$2 per vehicle will be made for overnight camping at Fishermen's Bend Recreation Site starting Saturday according to officials of the Bureau of Land Management's Salem District Office. Fishermen's Bend is located on Highway 22 about 3 miles west of Mill City and has 38 overnight campsites and two group camping areas. Individual units are available on a first-come-first-served basis, while group areas may be reserved in advance.

Golden Eagle passport holders will receive \$1 credit toward the charge.

All other BLM campgrounds in the Salem District are free of charge.

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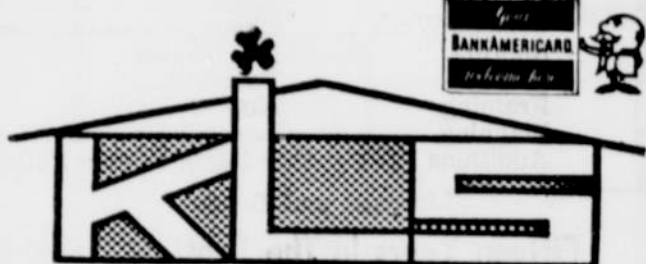
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
