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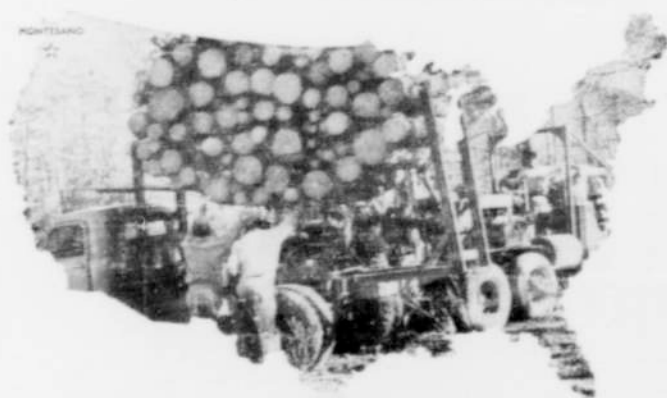
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Lions Elect

George Friedrichs of Anancy, France, was elected president of Lions International at the association's 55th annual convention in Mexico City, June 28-July 1. Serving as the 56th president of the world's largest humanitarian service organization, Friedrichs leads over 979,000 members in 25,646 clubs located in 147 countries and geographical areas.

His 1972-1973 program stresses the need to increase understanding and cooperation between Lions Clubs through projects in international service. Increased participation by the clubs in the international youth exchange program is among the goals Friedrichs has set for his presidential year.

COST CUTTING IS CRITICAL NEED

There are numerous proposals being presented to Congress for "reforming" the federal tax system. Recently, Ways and Means Committee Chairman Rep. Wilbur Mills and Sen. Mike Mansfield proposed to set termination dates for fifty-four provisions of the Internal Revenue Code to ensure review of all so-called tax preferences.

Business confidence would be severely shaken by such a procedure, even if the provisions were re-enacted. Similarly, individuals would face great uncertainty in making their own plans. Tax reform consideration can be assured effectively without setting termination dates. This was done in 1969.

The real problem remains—unfettered growth in government spending. It makes more sense to set termination dates for various spending programs than for tax provisions.
