* Most current theories on arthritis lay the blame on a virus, but no one so far has been able to come up with the bug. A New York researcher at Mt. Sinai Medical School thinks that pigs may help in the search. This idea stems from the fact that pigs, too, get arthritis—or something very close—that can definitely be blamed on a bacterium known as *Erwinia*. During the early stages of the affliction, the bacterium shows up and then vanishes. Dr. Steinman feels that if he is able to locate the bacterium, he may get an idea of where to look for an arthritis-causing virus in humans.
