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# We both kept busy in 1971. Mrs. Jones.

For all of us, 1971 was a busy year. For you, as an individual and for us, as a company.

We all became more aware of our environment and the problems of controlling pollution. Many people like you and companies like us



spent more time, more effort and more money trying to solve some of these problems.

## We sought ways to fight pollution.

You see, fuel-burning power plants give off tiny fly ash particles which, if uncontrolled, would pollute the air around our plant sites.

To preserve air quality, we are equipping our new generating plants with the most modern control equipment available. At the 1,400,000-kilowatt plant near Centralia, Washington, we're using huge electrostatic precipitators. The new 330,000-kilowatt addition at our Dave Johnston plant in Wyoming has a "wet scrubber," which literally washes dirt out of the furnace exhaust. And we've ordered other large precipitators for the 1,500,000-kilowatt Jim Bridger plant we're building in Wyoming with the Idaho Power Company.

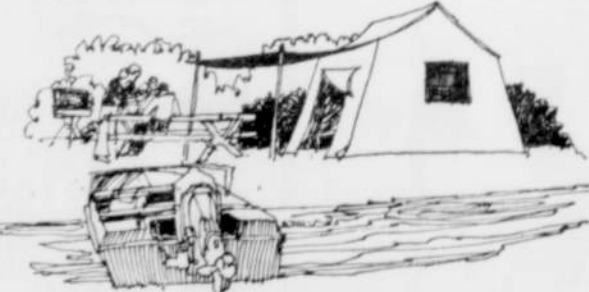
## We worked to keep our area livable.

Providing adequate supplies of electricity for the requirements of today's world takes a

lot of work—especially when you do it with real concern for the livability of the region. And it takes a lot of money—more than \$50,000,000 just for anti-pollution equipment at these new plants.

There were other environmental steps, too, such as cooling towers to recycle the large quantities of water these plants use. These avoid doing harm to our streams.

We continued working with University of Wyoming and Washington State University experts, with the soil conservation service, county extension agents and others on methods for restoration of coal field areas once the fuel has been removed. Contouring and seeding are being done at the Dave Johnston and Centralia sites to make sure they will again harmonize with their surroundings.



## We found ways to be a good citizen.

As a citizen of the area it serves, the electric company is continually involved in a wide variety of environmental activities, often before they become matters of public concern. And 1971 was no different.

The Chamber of Commerce for Klamath County, Oregon, presented us with its first Environmental Improvement Award for wildlife and fisheries, channel improvement and park work we did on the Klamath River in connec-

tion with hydroelectric development. We're proud of that.

We continued our fisheries work on other hydro streams in Oregon, Washington and Montana. On one stream we shut down two small generators part of the year to protect migrating fish. At Hellgate Canyon on the



famous Rogue river we presented 159 acres to the United States to become part of the Wild and Scenic Rivers system. We dedicated the pioneer Winchester Dam on the Umpqua river to public recreation.

We carried along studies devoted to farm irrigation, drainage and soil heating, as well as research into marine aquaculture with warmed water.

A very busy year, 1971.

Which brings us up to the present.

Today, we're still busy, perfecting the pollution controls we've installed, expanding our clean-up programs.

And we'll stay busy, right along with you.

Appreciating our environment. And helping to keep it clean.
