Influenza infections in pregnant women may result in greater than normal risk that the offspring will subsequently develop such childhood cancers as leukemia and Hodgkins disease, 2 British researchers report. They found that cancer occurred in 0.4% of such children — 9 times the expected incidence.

A type of migraine headache that affects some women at the onset of their menstrual period is caused by a drop in the body's estrogen levels, reports Dr. Brian W. Somerville, a Sydney, Australia, neurologist. He says that administration of estradiol to these patients invariably postpones the attacks.

The average yearly medical bill for a person 65 or older during 1971 was \$861, compared to \$140 for a youth under 19, and \$323 for a person between 19 and 64 years of age, reports the Dept. of HEW. Two-thirds of the medical expenses of the aged was paid by Medicare and Medicaid.
